"Wouldn't the streets look monotonous if all the women were dressed alike?" exclaimed Mrs. F. J. Burnett, leader of the department. "It would be a sight for God and men."

"It would be such a funny spectacle, Think of the old and the young women, the fat and the slim women, all affecting the same style of dress," laughed a sec-

"Humph! If they want something hygienic and comfortable, why don't they launch a national movement for women to wear mother hubbards," cried a third. "How can we show our originality or individuality if we are all to dress alike," another woman wanted to know.

Polymuriel on Anvil. The Polymuriel, a costume designed for all occasions, which has won much notice lately, received no more favor from the club women. "Of course it is most adaptable, but it doesn't appeal to me," was the sentiment most expressed.

The discussion then veered around to the criticism heaped upon women for the styles they buy.

Women are not to be blamed for the clothes they buy. They have no choice. We have to buy what we can get and when tight skirts are in vogue, tight skirts we must wear, because the stores show nothing else," asserted Mrs. Burnett.
