

COUNCIL MAY RENT ANOTHER HOSPITAL

City Commissioners to Ask Fifteen Physicians Regarding Scarlet Fever Situation.

NEED REFUGE FOR MANY CASES

At an executive conference the city commissioners decided to call fifteen physicians Monday afternoon for discussion of the scarlet fever situation, and for the particular purpose of determining whether the city would be justified in declaring an emergency to provide funds for renting another hospital for the care of scarlet fever patients.

The City Emergency hospital on Douglas street, and a small hospital rented by the city at Twenty-second and Lake streets, have been filled to capacity, and the health office reports there are approximately twenty-five other patients who should be sent to an isolation hospital.

As a matter of policy, Health Commissioner Connell will not disclose the total number of cases in this city at this time, and ever Commissioner Hummel, temporarily in charge of the health department, says he does not have this information, but expects the full situation will be disclosed next Monday morning at the regular meeting of the city council committee of the whole.

The health commissioner did not attend the conference held, although it is understood he urges more hospital provisions. The mayor and health commissioner discussed the situation during the afternoon.

Dr. Connell stated that the scarlet fever situation is improving.
