It was estimated that 1,500,000 bushels of wheat in cash and futures were through backward today by foreigners and exporters. Some of the holdings thus unloased were asid to consist of spring wheat of high grade. Bears were quick to seize the advantage and were able to force the market almost continuously downward after the descent had once begun, as early support had been based to a large extent on the assumed likelihood of increased export demand.

Snow and sleet predicted for the entire domestic wheat belt was taken to ind cate that receipts would remain small for several days. The effect was adverse to the bears in the early trading, but the influence was afterwards lost sight of.

Corn rose to a new hish price record for this squaon. Rumors were current that the British government had bought 1,200,000 bushels or more.

Oats responded to the corn strength, but the downturn in wheat led to realising sales. Cash demard was low.
