NEW YORK, Jan. 30 .- An external explosion, probably caused by an exploding mine, disabled the Holland-America liner Ryndam, off the English coast somewhere between Deal and Falmouth on its way from New York to Rotterdam, according to officers of the Rotterdam, a sister ship, which arrived here tonight.
