### PLENTY IN RACE FOR DELEGATES

Indications Point to Full List of Candidates for Chicago Position.

### LEEDOM OUT AFTER OFFICE

(From a Staff Correspondent.) LINCOLN, Feb. 2.—(Special.)—That there will be no dearth of candidates for delegates to the national republican convention is evident, at least for the district positions. For delegates-at-large, however, there does not seem to be quite so good a crop.

For district delegates, J. Reid Green of Lincoln has already filed in the First district, and it is understood that Editor Street of Nebraska City also desires to get in the race.

In the Second district it is said N. C. Pratt of Omaha would like to go to the convention, and there are probably others.

Two in the Fourth.

In the Third district, no one has as yet made announcement, but in the Fourth district W. F. Farley of Aurora and Peter Jackson of Beatrice are avowed candidates. In the Fifth district there is still silence, but in the Sixth Isaac A. Renuau, former secretary of the republican state committee, the Broken Bow statesman, is a candidate.

For delegates-at-large, there is still a rumor that G. W. Wattle of Omaha, Frank Currie of Broken Bow, and A. C. Epperson of Clay may get into the race. The name of Senator J. H. Kemp of Fullerton has been mentioned by many.

### Leedom in the Race.

Joe S. Leedom of Gordon has filed for the republican nomination for land commissioner. Mr. Leedom, one of the youngest newspaper men of the state, graduated from his father's print shop at Ord, Mo., and has been going it alone ever since. He is said to be one of the live wires of the north part of the state, which has not furnished many state officers so far. He is editor of the Gordon Journal and very popular with the newspaper men of that part of the state.

### Aurora Catholic Church is Burned

AURORA, Neb., Feb. 2.—(Special Telegram.)—Fire damaged the Catholic church here early today, to the extent of \$3,000. The loss is fully covered by insurance.

The church caught fire from the chimney and the roof, which was ablaze before discovered. The big cross on the tower was the last thing to fall. This same church was seriously damaged by fire just a year ago.

### BIG DOCKET FOR DISTRICT COURT AT GLENWOOD

GLENWOOD, Ia., Feb. 2.—(Special.)—Judge Rockafellow will convene court in Glenwood on February 15. There are about 115 old cases on the docket, which is not made up.

The grand jurors for the year are J. W. Carter, M. J. Williams and J. J. McCoy, Glenwood; Elmer Fieble and William Kneeland, Malvern; W. E. McGrew and A. Cites, Emerson; Charles Fisher, Pacific Junction; G. S. Purcell, Hastings; J. F. Schoening, Silver City; Morgan Alexander, Bartlett, and William Mackey, Tabor.

### GUNDER REVIVAL AT GLENWOOD IS SUCCESS

GLENWOOD, Ia., Feb. 2.—(Special.)—S. M. Foster, business manager of the "Gunder Evangelistic Party," went to Onawa, Ia., Friday, where the party will open a campaign on February 12. The meetings here have been well attended, and so far about \$90 has been professed conversion. Mr. Gunder is a forceful speaker and the company is well organized for their work. The meetings will close here as now planned, next Sunday evening. The Tabernacle has been too small to accommodate the people desiring to hear the services. The meetings have probably been the most successful ever held in Glenwood.

### State Capitol Notes

(From a Staff Correspondent.) LINCOLN, Feb. 2.—(Special.)—The Standard Oil company has joined with other oil companies and enters a cross-petition in the supreme court in support of the fight being made against the law regarding inspections of oils.

The State Prison board will hold its monthly meeting tomorrow at the penitentiary to take up matters of parole. There are no applications for pardon.

Miss Lulu Wolford of the state superintendent's office has gone to Brock to meet the school patrons who are anxious to bring about a consolidation of school districts in and around that town.

James Murphy, chief clerk in the office of the State Banking board, has been transferred to the insurance department temporarily and will take up the work of inspection of insurance companies. There will be no appointment to his place in the banking department.

The State Forestry commission met today at Lincoln. The commission consists of Woodruff Ball of Alliance, Carl Rhode of Columbus and A. H. Metzger of Beatrice, and took up the matter of gathering of statistics and publication of the same with Secretary Mellor of the state fair board.

### Bartos Brought Into Jury Bribing Case

(From a Staff Correspondent.) LINCOLN, Feb. 2.—(Special Telegram.)—A complaint was issued today by County Attorney Hager charging Frank W. Bartos of Wilber, former state senator, and Richard W. Stanley, who runs a detective agency in Lincoln, with conspiring to bribe jurors.

The charges come through the arrest of Theodore B. Ross in Des Moines yesterday, who was brought to Lincoln today, under a charge of contempt of court in trying to bribe Juror John M. Burr, who was called in a case involving litigation between the Farmers and Merchants bank of Des Moines and the Farmers and Merchants bank of Walnut.

Ross, when questioned by the police, implicated Bartos and Stanley. Ross said he had never talked with Bartos, but had been informed by Stanley that if they could fix things all right Bartos would make it right with them.

### Leedom Files for Land Commissioner

GORDON, Neb., Feb. 2.—(Special.)—Joseph W. Leedom, who is associated with his father, Boyd S. Leedom, in the publication of the Gordon Journal, has announced his candidacy for the republican nomination for commissioner of public buildings and grounds. Mr. Leedom is one of the active young republicans in the western section of the state and is making his campaign largely on the contention that the affairs of the office can be best administered by a man who is a resident of that section of the state, where most of the public lands are located, and who has a personal knowledge of the problems to be solved. Mr. Leedom is a native of Nebraska and was educated in the public schools of Omond, Mo., and attended college at Sioux City and at the University of Nebraska. He specialized in history and civics, and since leaving school has always taken an active interest in affairs of government.

### SON OF STELLA PASTOR SUDDENLY DISAPPEARS

STELLA, Neb., Feb. 2.—(Special.)—After a thorough investigation by the ministers of Stella, it was concluded that the mysterious disappearance of Rev. J. Paul Reeves, son of Rev. A. S. Reeves of the Disciples' church, was due to either foul play or an unbalanced condition of the mind, caused by sickness. He was last seen at Haddam, Kan., January 6, 1916, where he complained of a severe attack of grip. Rev. Mr. Reeves is 35 years old. His wife and child are at the home of his parents at Stella, Neb. Rev. J. Paul Reeves was formerly pastor at White Cloud, Kan., but recently went to Morrowville. His father is in Kansas trying to discover the whereabouts of his son.

### McCALL WITHDRAWS NAME FROM NORTH STAR BALLOT

ST. PAUL, Minn., Feb. 2.—Secretary of State Julius A. Schmahl today withdrew the name of Governor Samuel W. McCall of Massachusetts as a candidate in the Minnesota republican presidential primaries. This action was taken on the telegraphed request of Governor McCall.

The officers were installed by Penton Daniels, a deputy of the International Bricklayers' union.

H. A. Hill yesterday received the announcement of the death of his mother, Mrs. R. A. Hill, formerly of this city, which occurred at the home of her son at Norman, Okl. She was 85 years of age and is survived by a family of seven children.

Peter Gallogly, a pioneer resident of Barneston, is dead at the age of 73 years. He was a native of Ireland and leaves his widow and seven children.

Clyde Booth of this city, who leaves last season for the Fairbury ball team in the Nebraska State league, has signed with the Topeka team in the Western league.

### SHERIFF C. D. QUINTON FILES FOR SIXTH TERM

AVOCA, Neb., Feb. 2.—(Special.)—Sheriff C. D. Quinton, present sheriff of this county, has filed his petition with the county clerk asking that his name be placed on the republican ticket as a candidate for another term. Mr. Quinton resided here before being elected to that office, which he has filled for the last ten years.

### Cedar Bank Farm Sold.

YORK, Neb., Feb. 2.—(Special.)—Yesterday Cedar Bank farm, located one and three-quarters miles north of this city, formerly owned by Thomas Miller, was sold at public auction. The farm consists of eighty-seven acres and J. M. Lookwood of Marengo, Ia., was the purchaser, and the price paid was \$30,000 per acre, or \$2,415,000. At the same time eighty-one head of Poland-China hogs were sold at an average of \$1 per head. There was a very large attendance at the sale of farmers and stockraisers from Iowa and Illinois.
