

PRISONERS ABOARD MAY COME ASHORE

Everybody Aboard the Appam May Land Except Members of the Prize Crew.

ANOTHER SEA RAIDER AT LARGE

BULLETIN. NEWPORT NEWS, Va., Feb. 3.—Everyone aboard the Appam except the prize officer and members of the prize crew will be permitted to land whenever they desire, it was decided late today.

WASHINGTON, Feb. 3.—Secretary Lansing stated today that there was no question as to the Appam's status as a prize, but that the question of its disposition still involved further consideration of The Hague convention and the Prussian-American treaty. Lieutenant Berg's refusal to land British seamen who were gun pointers on British merchantmen will be the subject of further consideration.

Possibility that a still more formidable German sea raider than has been reported—the fast cruiser Moon—is at large in the Atlantic, and the report that the Moon was near by and directed the operations of the raider called the Moosa, which sunk six ships and captured the Appam within 200 miles off the coast of Spain, promises to add another chapter to the yet untold story of the daring of the German sailors.

Fast, Powerful Boat.

The Moon is a fast, heavily armored cruiser of nearly 10,000 tons, with more than 16,000-horsepower, 400 feet long, and with both oil and coal boilers. It was built at Kiel, in 1906, has four funnels and extra high wireless masts. It carries a Krupp armor belt, four torpedo tubes, which give discharges forward, astern and broadside, and mounts twenty-eight guns in all, four 8.2, ten 5.5-inch and fourteen 2.5-inch.

The British embassy denies that it has information that the Moon is at large and was reported off the Canary Islands, but the story that it accompanied the Moosa is accredited to British aboard the Appam.

Appam at Newport News.

NEWPORT NEWS, Feb. 3.—The captured British liner Appam, in charge of a German prize crew, anchored in the James river, off Newport News, shortly after 11 o'clock this morning.

The prisoners will be removed to barges and taken to Norfolk on board an Old Dominion line steamer for New York. Some of the more prominent English passengers were expected to come to Newport News.

CALLS HALT ON BAITING YANKEES

Frankfurt Paper in Inspired Article Says Intemperate Criticism Might Drive U. S. to Aid Allies.

MIGHT CHANGE WHOLE OUTLOOK

FRANKFORT - ON - THE - MAIN, Feb. 3.—(Via London.)—The Frankfurt Zeitung, whose utterances on certain subjects are regarded as inspired, prints an article in which vigorous objection is expressed to the tone adopted by the press of Berlin in discussing Secretary Lansing's note on submarine warfare and the arming of merchantmen and in particular to the statements made in Berlin that the proposals are unacceptable to Germany.

It dissents from the position taken by the Kreuz Zeitung and Prof. Von Stengel that Germany has no interest in negotiations regarding the freedom of the seas, since England, with America's assistance, is only using the negotiations to wrest from Germany's hands its submarine weapons.

To this the Zeitung rejoins: "It is a gross offense, not only against international law, but against the moral elementary conception of good morals, to charge openly that the United States, with which Germany is not at enmity, is putting forth efforts in the sphere of international law merely with the perfidious purpose of helping England."

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ASSERTS APPAM CAME AS A PRIZE

German Ambassador Formally Serves Notice His Government Contends for Possession.

CLAIM LIKELY TO BE ALLOWED

WASHINGTON, Feb. 3.—Indications that the British passenger liner Appam, brought into Hampton Roads by a German prize crew, will be held by the United States to be a German prize of war and not an auxiliary cruiser, were given tonight in high official quarters.

The neutrality board, which advises the State department on such questions, announced today that the ship was a prize, but the announcement was recalled later, presumably because the State department itself has not acted.

The real point to be decided is whether the Appam shall remain in possession of the prize crew under the terms of the Prussian-American treaty or shall be returned to its British owners under the Hague convention. Indications were given that the State department will hold that the prize belongs to Germany.

FAR NORTHWEST IS IN SNOW'S EMBRACE

Feet on Feet Piled in Cities of North Pacific Slope and Railroad Traffic is Tied Up.

PROPERTY DAMAGE IS HEAVY

SEATTLE, Wash., Feb. 3.—Overburdened by the weight of tons of snow and ice, the dome of St. James cathedral of the Roman Catholic church at Ninth avenue and Cherry street, collapsed late today, and shortly afterwards the roof of the West Seattle Christian church at West Genesee street and Forty-second Avenue Southwest fell in.

Grandstands on Denny athletic field at the University of Washington gave way today and extensive damage was done throughout the city by the breaking of skylights and awnings and the splintering of trees. Telephone and telegraph services was badly hampered, and all street cars except three lines operated by cable had been forced tonight to suspend.

Worst Storm in Thirty Years.

Seattle's plight was shared to a comparative extent by cities and towns throughout the northwest. The snowstorm is reckoned the worst in thirty years. So deep are the drifts in the mountains that railroad traffic generally is a standstill. Portland, Ore., where a "silver" thaw has demoralized street car traffic and business and forced, as in Seattle, the closure of schools, has sustained damage estimated at \$100,000.

In this city the damage will be much greater. The damage at St. James' cathedral alone was placed tonight at \$50,000.

A man shoveling snow from the roof of a six-story building in the downtown district here, was killed today when he lost his footing and fell to the ground.

At Walla Walla, Kenneth Cameron went too close to the edge of the bluff and fell into twenty feet of snow. Efforts still were being made tonight to dig him out.

Snow is Falling.

Snow continued to fall here tonight. It lay two feet deep in the downtown district and deeper in the suburbs. Tonight business streets were deserted and the theaters were almost empty.

Every laborer able to handle a shovel was pressed into service cleaning sidewalks and burdened roofs. The railroads have surrendered unconditionally to the snow and have stopped trying to keep their rails uncovered.

The cuts fill with snow as soon as cleared. It is estimated that the snow in Spokane rose, on the Milwaukee line, to nearly thirty feet deep. At Martin, the highest point on the northern Pacific, the snow is over sixteen feet deep.

Three overland trains have been stalled on the Northern Pacific since yesterday. All have sleeping cars and abundance of blankets, fuel and food and the passengers are suffering no privations during their imprisonment, which may continue several days longer.

Two Great Northern trains, each with half a dozen passengers, are held on the west slope, in safe places.

On the Milwaukee railroad train No. 10, the eastbound Columbus, which left Seattle yesterday, was able to proceed only forty miles, to Cedar Falls, where it was impressed by the snow.

TWO HUNREDD ARE KILLED IN AIR RAID

Zeppelin Flyer Drops Many Incendiary and Explosive Bombs On Saloniki.

WAREHOUSES ARE DESTROYED

LONDON, Feb. 3.—A dispatch to the Exchange Telegraph company from Athens says that 200 persons were killed and 100 injured in the Zeppelin raid on Saloniki, two prisoners being included in the number killed.

The Zeppelin which on Tuesday boned Saloniki was of very large dimensions. After making a wide detour of the city it began its operations from a height of 2,000 feet by dropping five bombs which fell into the sea.

The raiders missed the next target, but tore a woman to pieces and wounded a small boy.

Another bomb set fire to warehouses filled with fats, oils, benzene and sugar. The buildings flared up like a torch and the population became wildly excited. A company of French gendarmes and a platoon of soldiers hurried up and restored a semblance of order.

Meanwhile, the Zeppelin continued to rain down its missiles, one of which demolished the mosque of Yusuf Pasha, killing three and injuring eleven Greek refugees from Asia Minor. Another bomb crashed through the roof of a house and instantly killed five persons.

Fast aeroplanes rose in pursuit of the Zeppelin. The fire was prevented from spreading. Bombs thrown from the Zeppelin weighed about 100 pounds each and were dropped from a height of about 2,000 feet.
