Mr. Maurer, who said he was a machinist who has been in constant touch with large organizations of laboring men, met with repeated applause from the crowd in the committee rooms, composed of about equal numbers of men and women. lie spoke, he explained, not for organised labor, but for the working classes, and charged that the present call for arms was inspired by those who were making immense profit selling ammunities and who at the close of the European war will want a large army and navy to en-force the collection of the money owed them by bankrupt nations.

"The working people will not consent to fight such a war," he said. "Instead of spending more money, I think congress had better investigate the money already apent. The people have believed we were prepared. We were told we were the greatest power on earth. Less than two years ago we were told that we could beat Germany and Mexico at the

The workingmen will refuse to be cannon fodder their wars and then be called on to pay the bills too. If it is right to take the workingman's life, it is right to take the rich man's fortune. Bopp was reported indicted under the Sherman anti-trust law and under the section of the penal code which forbids a conspiracy to set on foot military expeditions from the United States against a friendly nation.
