MORE CANDIDATES ENTER THE FRAY

A. L. Sutton of Douglas Completes His Filing for Nomination for Governor.

JUDGE ALBERT FOR SENATOR

(From a Staff Correspondent.) LINCOLN, Feb. 8.—(Special.)—Filing this morning to the office of the secretary of state include the following: Abraham L. Sutton of Omaha, for the republican nomination for governor.

L. L. Albert of Columbus, for the democratic nomination for the state senate for the Eleventh district, composed of the counties of Polk, Platt and Merrick, represented in the last session by Senator Krumbach of Polk.

C. E. Sandall of York, placed in nomination by a petition from Aurora for re-nomination as senator from the Seventh district, composed of York and Hamilton counties.

William Scott of Magnet, for the democratic nomination for the state senate from the Eighth district, composed of the counties of Cedar and Knox, represented in the last session by Senator Charles Ruden of Crofton.

John S. McCarty of Lincoln will be a candidate for the democratic nomination for congress in the First district, having this morning accepted the petition filed last week.

Judge Bruno Hostetter of Kearney has filed for re-nomination as district judge of that district.

Twenty Days for Shooting Quail

PLATTSBURGH, Neb., Feb. 8.—(Special.)—George Hobson was brought before Justice Archer Monday to answer to a complaint charging him with violation of the Nebraska game law by shooting two quail, which are protected by law from the hunters. The young man entered a plea of guilty to the charge of shooting two quail, and not being able to pay the fine and costs was sentenced to jail for twenty days.

COL. RICHMOND, BOOSTER, IS BACKING SOPHUS NEBLE

LINCOLN, Feb. 8.—(Special.)—Colonel Henry Clay Richmond of Omaha, statesman, journalist, orator, and now officiating in the way of maker of governors, is again on the job. The last time Colonel Richmond visited Lincoln he picked a candidate for the democratic nomination for governor in the person of a Lincoln merchant, but the picking was not good and the candidate did not appear to be ripe for the plucking.

This time he comes forward and pushes his fellow townsman and next door neighbor, Sophus F. Neble, editor of the Danish Pioneer of Omaha, as the man to lead the badly demoralized hosts of democracy up the hill of dependency. He says that Nebraska would do itself proud to elect Colonel Neble governor and he is for him.

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Clifford Thorne Ready with Brief Against Brandeis

LINCOLN, Feb. 8.—(Special.)—A brief of Clifford Thorne, chairman of the Iowa Railway commission prepared in his efforts to have the confirmation of Louis D. Brandeis as justice of the supreme court knocked in the head by the senate, because he alleges that Brandeis was not square with the people in the fight he made before the Interstate Commerce commission in the advance rate cases, has reached the members of the Nebraska commission.

The brief states that "On behalf of the state railway commissions of the eight states interested, the American National Live Stock commission and the farm grain dealers, representing 25,000 shippers, who have commissioned me to speak, I hereby repudiate in unqualified terms the concessions made by Mr. Brandeis in closing the argument on behalf of the public in the advance rate cases before your honorable body."

Referring to statement made by Brandeis that "there should be no basis, we ought not to consider mere percentages, we should not attempt to say what is a reasonable surplus," Mr. Thorne says, "this is a pretty argument from the railroad standpoint."

Hastings Institute Cannot Use Schools

HASTINGS, Neb., Feb. 8.—(Special Telegram.)—The Hastings institute, organized to teach religion and social conditions, was turned down by the Board of Education last night in the request for the use of the high school building for classes. The institute is nonsectarian and plans to take a social survey of Hastings.

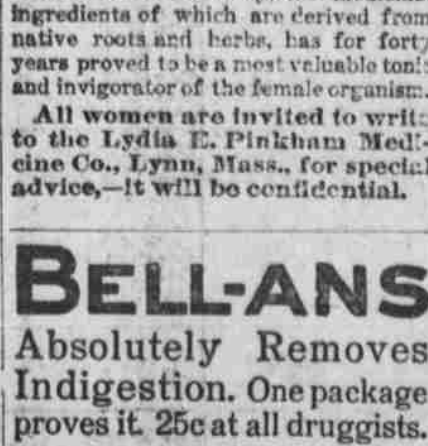
