ARMOR PLATE MEN MAKING THREATS

Senate Notified Price Will Be Advanced \$200 a Ton if Government Builds Plant.

COMMITTEE NOT FRIGHTENED

WASHINGTON, Feb. 8.—Private armor plate manufacturers notified the senate naval committee today that they would raise the price of armor plate \$200 a ton if congress decides to erect or purchase armor plate factories for the government.

After brief consideration, the committee ordered favorably reported the bill authorizing expenditure of \$500,000 to equip Mare Island Navy yard for battleship construction, and \$100,000 to enlarge facilities of the New York Navy yard and the bill to introduce midshipmen to the first class at Annapolis next July.

Three Votes Against It. Senator Penrose notified the committee of the stand of armor plate manufacturers, those chiefly concerned being Bethlehem and Midvale Steel companies.

The threat of the armor barons to hold up the government will not affect congress," said Senator Tillman.
