HOWARD COUNTY PEOPLE ROUSED

Controversy Over Reappraisal of School Lands Brings to Attention Public Problem.

(From a Staff Correspondent.) LINCOLN, Feb. 14 .- (Special.) -- The con of the State Board of Lands and Funds favoring a reassessment of certain school lands in Howard county has stirred up according to a statement coming to the office of Land Commissioner Beckmann, people are considerably stirred up over the matter in Howard county and the action of the Cherry county commis-sioners asking that if Howard county lands be reduced than lands in that ounty also be reduced.

This has caused the state board to take notice of what it will mean to the school fund of the state if a reduction is made as asked for by Howard county. Discussing the matter the St. Paul paper sald:

There has been considerable centroversy regarding the apraisement of the school lands made in this county in 1915, which raised the average valuation to \$12.61. For eleven years prior to this time there were a number of tracts in this county which had been appraised at \$1 per acre and the state got the magnificent aum of \$ cents per acre rental or \$2.40 per forty a year.

The last appraisement of the county commissioners lowered the average from \$12.07 to \$3.94, thus depriving the state school fund of \$6.638.16 per year. There There was no doubt ther some land in the county might have been assessed too high, but here could not possibly be many tracts according to the information at hand. While on the other hand there are tracts that average well with land that is assessed at \$22 per acre, and some which is valued at from \$40 to \$50 per acre. There are instances in this county where the lease holder has sold his holdings at from \$500 to \$1,550 as a bonus. There are instances also in the county where the lease holders on his county where the lease holders of not care for the land longer and are re-leasing to other partles for almost three times the amount paid the state by the original lease holders. There are instances in this county where the lease holders on his cares of school land is being held on a state lease of \$73 for 130 acres in a heighborhood where land could not be purchased for less than \$40 to \$50 per acre.

In view of the facts at hand, it behooves the people of the county to look into this matter more particularly than has been the practice. If these school lands are being handled by speculators and the state deprived of money rightfully belongs to the state school fund, and not to the speculator. I also behooves the taxpayors

land, then the past appraisement is far too low.

In all fairness to the state school fund, let those who know of these conditions report them as they are to the state, and if the school lands are in the hands of speculators, swat them and swat them hard. The land speculator has been an aggravation for years past and it is high time the shackles were broken.

A petition is now in circulation and being freely signed, asking the state board to annul the last appraisement and let the old one of 1914 stand, or raise the good land to somewhere near its value.


