Bandits Hold Up Motor Bus Near Los Angeles, Cal.

LOS ANGELES, Cal., Feb. 18.—The Los Angeles police department was searching early today for traces of four armed men who are believed to have participated in a series of holdups which took place last night between Los Angeles and Venice, a beach resort. Although it was unofficially reported that seven automobile parties and an interurban street car were robbed, the police have received first-hand information of but one crime, the holding up of a motor bus operating between Los Angeles and Venice and the robbing of the seven men passengers and the chauffeur of \$6 in money and a small amount of jewelry. One of the passengers stated that one of the robbers said that this was the seventh automobile "we have held up tonight." He also reported that two of the robbers wore women's hats and veils and the others masks. They are believed to have traveled in an automobile. All the alleged robberies are said to have taken place in the same locality.

Insurance Man Who Meets Many Rebuffs

Has it come to this? An ambitious young insurance man who has an office in the Keelie building agreed to circulate petitions in Omaha for the submission of the name of W. J. Ryan at the April primary as delegate-at-large to the democratic national convention. When he assumed this task upon request of a Lincoln friend he thought it would prove a business booster for himself. He viewed with considerable disfavor the prospect of meeting the demagogue of Omaha and asking them to sign for the man whose leadership here a few years ago was something to conjure with. This young insurance man entered the city hall with his petition and told a sad story of having met with many rebuffs. He said at least 200 democrats had refused to sign his petition. He did not venture beyond the first floor of the city hall.

GOOD ROADS BOOSTERS MEETING AT DES MOINES

DES MOINES, Ia., Feb. 18.—Perhaps the greatest meeting ever held in Iowa, at which the betterment of Iowa highways was the chief and only subject, was begun here today by nearly 1,500 good roads enthusiasts. Plans for the convention were made by the Jefferson and Lincoln highway associations, the Iowa Bankers' association, commercial organizations of the state, the Des Moines automobile show and the Greater Des Moines committee. F. C. Carson of Iowa City, E. H. Spaulding of Grinnell and W. A. Hopkins of Lamoni made many of the preliminary arrangements. The convention is being held in conjunction with the Des Moines automobile show, which opened last Monday. Among the speakers on the program are members of the state better road commission and the state highway commission. One of the subjects to be considered at the convention will be the placing of guide posts on the Lincoln Highway.

GOOD ROADS BOND ISSUE GOES THROUGH WITH WHOOP

Officers of the Omaha Auto club are much elated over the passage, 6 to 1, of a \$2,000,000 bond issue for good roads purposes in St. Louis county, Missouri, this week. The Auto club of St. Louis was largely instrumental in the success of the bond issue. Local auto club men regard the St. Louis bond issue as a favorable omen in the coming submission of a similar bond issue proposition for Douglas county, by which the roads here will be greatly improved for auto and farm traffic. The St. Louis issue was the largest of its kind ever passed in the middle-west. Assistant Secretary S. E. Henderson of Chattanooga, Tenn.; E. W. Hughes of San Francisco and Frank M. Bristol of Omaha, resident bishop for this territory. This movement, which has as its goal the acquisition of 250,000 new church members, originated in the mind of Bishop Henderson when he was chairman of the evangelistic commission.

CRONES WRITES ANOTHER LETTER

Man Who Put Poison in Soup at Chicago Banquet Gives His Point of View.

HANDWRITING IS IDENTIFIED
NEW YORK, Feb. 18.—Believing that Jean Cronos, the Chicago chef accused of poisoning the soup at a dinner of Catholic clergymen and laymen in that city, is in New York or near by, the police made every effort today to run him down. The authorities think Cronos is the author of two letters mailed in this city to the New York Times in which the writer boasts that he has escaped arrest and makes veiled threats. The identification by John M. McCourt, assistant United States district attorney at Scranton, Pa., of the fac simile of the first Cronos letter received here as the handwriting of the man wanted in Chicago stimulated the police efforts here. Cronos writing was identified by examination papers he had sent to a correspondence school in Scranton. The second letter, apparently signed by Cronos, received by the New York paper last night, contained what purported to be his finger prints. The police are endeavoring to learn by these prints whether Cronos had a record in the police bureau of identification.

Text of His Letter. In this letter the writer attempted to tell in an incoherent manner "why I did it." Many of the words are misspelled, as was the case in the previous letter. The writer asserted that "while in Europe millions of Christians are slaughtering each other in the most bloody massacre, and in these free country thousands of men and women are tramping the streets without food and shelter at the very same time the church holds dinners and pays 15¢ for each cover which starts with Bologna Caviar and Champagne, the same money which was heard from poor workmen and women the same money were the blood of poor workers, has run for.

"These conditions," the writer continued, "are a scandal. That is the failure of Christianity and an insult to humanity. Let the Church answer: whose my charges toward the world and I shall stand for the charges made a nation. "The police makes me laugh. When I was in Buffalo two spies were a terror. After a while they went back. . . . How foolish is the police no for two cents brains. Yesterday I was working for an hour around the police headquarters but no one came out and got me. I am glad that the spies from Chicago are coming that I know better at what time to let go."

Seeking Evidence of Plot.

CHICAGO, Feb. 18.—Following the publication this morning in New York papers of another letter believed to have been written by Jean Cronos, former assistant chef at the University club of Chicago, local police officials put on New York authorities the burden of responsibility for Cronos' arrest. Cronos is wanted in connection with the putting of poison in the soup at a banquet recently given Archbishop Mundelein.

LIPTON'S STEAM YACHT IS AUXILIARY CRUISER

NEW YORK, Feb. 18.—Sir Thomas Lipton's steam yacht, The Erin, which has often been seen in American waters as a tender to Sir Thomas' challengers for the America's cup, is now an auxiliary cruiser in the British navy, attached to the fleet that is guarding the North Sea against submarines. This information was contained in a letter received here from Sir Thomas, in which the yachtman stated that he is recovering from a long illness and intends soon to leave England for the United States and Canada. Sir Thomas was taken ill after returning from Serbia, where he took part in the organization of relief work during the typhus epidemic. The Erin carried the American contingent of nurses and surgeons to Serbia. Before that it was in service as a hospital vessel.
