Smoked Eel and Fish
Of All Kind Are on
The Local Market
Salt, smoked and dried fish are found
in great variety on the Omaha market
and provide a most nutritious as well as
an economical diet.
Here are fine mackerel, both the kind
that grows in the icy water around the
Norway coast and the cousin mackerel,
that is caught by our own New England
fishermen.
Salt herring are also here from Nor-
way, though the price has almost dou-
bled since the war started.
Salted "lake" fish, formerly known as
"whitefish," are on the market. Finnan
haddies, from Scotch waters, are still in
good supply in spite of the war.
Kipped salmon are especially fine.
If nothing but Holland herring will
satisfy you, you can get it by paying
about two and a half times as much for
it as you did a year ago. Cause, the war.

You can even get smoked eel and
sturgeon in the local market, prefer-
ably a rock.
The vast majority of the little oysters
are swallowed up and smothered by
drifting sand and mud, but a few survive
out of the millions that are born from
the eggs of a single female. When the
little oysters first become attached to
"shells" when they get large enough to
be transported to other places where they
may finish their growth, they are called
"seed oysters." There is a good deal to be
learned about an oyster besides the way
to eat it.

BATTLE ON FOR
BIG WILEY FARM

Man Who Held It Under a Lease
Now Said to Be Trying to
Keep Possession.

ONE IS IN SOUTH SIDE JAIL

Again claimants of the famous
"Clark farm," an expanse of 400 or
more acres of beautiful scenic prop-
erty, have become engaged in a
struggle with alleged "squatters" or
trespassers. This time J. R. Wil-
liams, barber, of Bellevue, has been
arrested, charged with trespassing
on the land without permission of
the owner. Williams told South Side
police that he had been instructed to
live on the land by William Swiner,
also of Bellevue, who says he is the
true proprietor of the property.

According to the story given local police
by Solon L. Wiley, who says he has a full
claim to the property as joint owner with
W. R. Patrick, South Side attorney, his
lease to Swiner, who formerly lived on
the land, had expired by mutual agree-
ment two weeks ago. The lease was writ-
ten to expire March 1. So when Williams
appeared on the land Thursday evening
in company with Swiner's son ready to
take possession of the house he was ar-
rested fifteen minutes after his arrival by
Constable H. P. Larsen of Sarpy county.
Williams is being held at the South Side
station and his employer, Swiner, has en-
gaged an attorney to secure his liberation.
The latter alleged that he has a complete
right to live on the property until March
1, and probably afterward.

EXPERTS ARE GIVING
ADVICE ON SHEEP FEEDING

The University of Wyoming is invading
the western portion of Nebraska and is
co-operating with the United States In-
terior department in an effort to give the
flockmasters some expert information re-
lative to carrying on the sheep industry.
A special demonstration car is working
out over the Burlington and Northwest-
ern, carrying a party of University of
Wyoming students and professors and
government representatives. Their cam-
paign will continue during the balance of
this month and the first week in March.
Stops are made at stations in the sheep
raising sections of western Nebraska and
Wyoming, where lectures are given on
sheep feeding, treatment of diseases to
which sheep are subject and the handling
of wool in getting it ready for sale.
