GUNNERS ROUTED BY BRANDEIS MEN

Townsend's Unable to Make Baskets When Scores Were Needed in Flipping Bee.

STORE TEAM WINS, 44 TO 15

The crack Brandeis Stores' five completely outclassed the Townsend Gun quintet at the Young Men's Christian association last evening in a 75-city league tilt, by the top-heavy score of 44 to 15. The Gunners were simply swamped by the accurate shooting of the Merchants, who found the basket with unerring aim. On the other hand, the range finders' attempts at bombarding the basket were futile, their many shots rolling in a tantalizing manner around the rim of the hoop.

The first half proved a merry-go-round for the Brandeis, culminating in an 18 to 5 rout. The gunners braced in the second period but could not stem the accurate shooting of their opponents.

FORMER GREAT FIRST SACKER TO BE MANAGER.



Fred Tenney is coming back to base ball. Fred will manage the Newark club of the International league this year. He is also part owner of the club, having purchased it jointly with Jim Price for \$5,000.

Tenney was one of the greatest first basemen the game ever knew. He played in the National league for fifteen years. For seven seasons he batted over .300. In 1894, with Boston, he hit .387. Fred went to the Giants late in 1907. McGraw traded Dan McGann, Gilbert Bowerman and others for Tenney and Bridwell. He was the regular first sacker in 1909 when the Giants lost the National league pennant through Fred Merkle's historic bon.
