County Again Tries To Stop Connell from Retaining Fees

In spite of the fact that they were beaten in court in a similar attempt several years ago, the Board of County Commissioners will again try to take away from City Health Commissioner R. W. Connell his income from fees accruing from vital statistics.

The board in turning down Connell's claim for \$44,750 adopted a resolution to that effect and announced its intention of starting another legal battle to seize what it terms Connell's "unearned increments."

In addition to Connell's salary as health commissioner, he gets at least \$1,500 for issuing birth and death certificates.

Since the merger with South Omaha and Dundee and the imminent possibility of further merger with Florence, the commissioners declare Connell's income from the fees alone will amount to about \$5,000 each year.

Commissioner John Lynch is promoting the fight to have this money turned into the public treasury and the rest of the board members are unanimous in backing him up.
