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NEW YORK STOCK MARKET

Necessary to Go Back Nearly Six Months for Parallel to Sluggish Session.

DEALINGS ARE PROFESSIONAL

NEW YORK, Feb. 23.—To find a parallel for today's sluggish and meaningless market it is necessary to go back almost six months to September of last year.

Dealings were concentrated in professional operations in speculative issues whose intrinsic worth remains to be established.

The hollow character of the trading may be gauged from the fact that American and British industrial alcohol, Mercantile Marine preferred and Baldwin and American Locomotive were among the most active stocks.

Developments at home and abroad over the holiday were not calculated to re-energize the market.

The market was generally more strongly inclined to the bear side.

According to market gossip, commission houses business was at a complete standstill.

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FARMERS START TO SOW SPRING SEED

Western Part of State in Good Condition and Farmers Begin to Sow Oats and Barley.

NO MORE HIGH WATER BOTHER

Reports reach the railroad offices that in a number of localities in the western part of Nebraska seeding has started, with the farmers sowing oats and barley largely.

In the western part of the state and over in Wyoming the day started in with temperatures ranging from 45 up to 60 degrees, with sunshine everywhere.

From the central portion of the state west the ground is said to be in perfect condition for starting the spring work.

The frost is pretty well out and the water from the melted snow has settled away.

Throughout eastern Nebraska the cold of Tuesday night held the waters back, allowing the streams to recede, and as a result, no flood damages are reported.

In many places some of the streams are over their banks, but not sufficiently high so that the water is not doing any damage.

Gorge forms in Platte. On the Burlington's line across the country from Plattsmouth to Ashland, just west of a gorge formed in the Platte, near Media, and across the water out over the bank and across some of the farmland in the vicinity.

The water is slipping over the grade a foot or two, and the water is broken up and success in keeping the ice broken up.

In the Missouri river, above Florence, the ice shows signs of breaking. The ice is covered with water to a depth of six inches to a foot and is beginning to bulge in the center.

All along the Omaha road between here and Sioux City and across on the branch from Emerson to Norfolk the streams have broken up and most of the ice has run out without doing any damage to track or bridges along the line.

Cedar Republicans Ask W. P. Warner to File for Congress

LAUREL, Neb., Feb. 23.—(Special.)—A meeting of the republican county central committee, candidates and leaders was held here and plans for the approaching campaign were discussed.

Most of the county officials now in office are republicans and they are all candidates for re-election except the county assessor.

The republicans will put a full ticket in the field. W. P. Warner of Dakota City was endorsed for congress and a telegram urging him to run was sent him.

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Wagon Bridge at Kearney in Danger

Lincoln, Neb., Feb. 23.—The mill-wagon bridge over the Platte river at Kearney is threatened with destruction by an ice gorge which has formed above the structure, according to a report reaching here today.

A dynamite squad has been at work attempting to clear the channel.

Other river points report no damage from the flood water, which is receding, although at many places the ice has not broken up.

Five spans of the bridge over the Platte at Elm Creek, fifteen miles west of Kearney, were swept out this morning by the ice. At Overton, ten miles farther west, two spans of a bridge were carried away.

The bottom lands along the river in this section of the state were being flooded this afternoon.

Fire at Bay City

BAY CITY, Mich., Feb. 23.—The International Mill and Lumber company's plant was destroyed tonight by fire of undetermined origin. The loss is placed at \$200,000.
