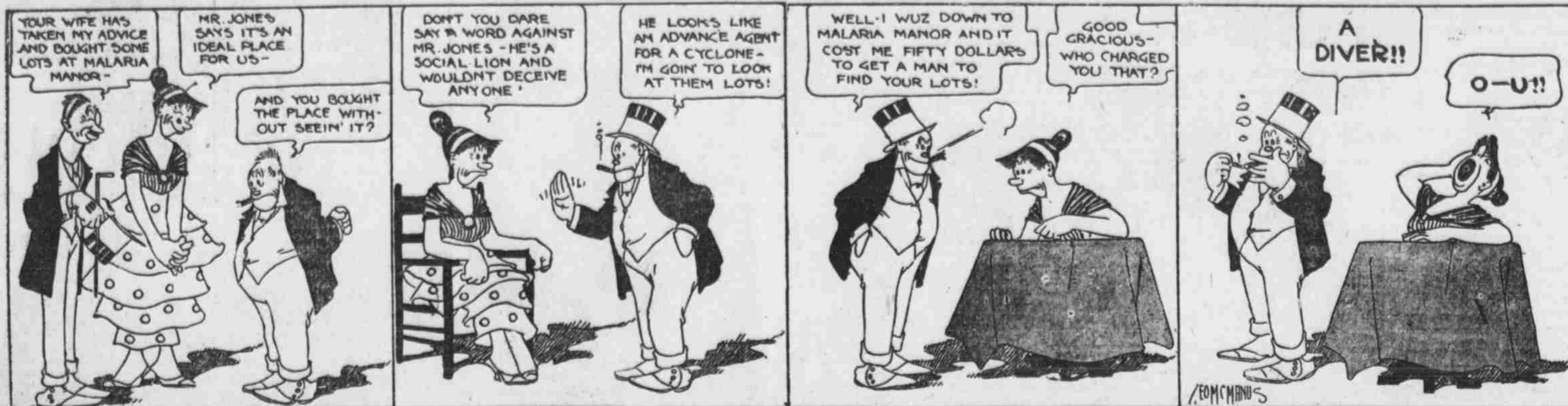

CHICAGO, Feb. 24.—Jens Willard, his manager, secretary and two trainers departed at 12:30 p. m. today for New York to begin training for his fight with Frank Moran March 25. To Chicago he left his personal assurance that he would return "still champion."

Bombs in Capitol Furnace Are Cause Of Big Sensation

LINCOLN, Neb., Feb. 24.—The mystery of the explosion which damaged a waste furnace in the state capitol last night and the finding of two brass tubes in the furnace this morning had not been solved this afternoon. The tubes found in the furnace today were similar to one blown out of the incinerator last night when the explosion occurred.

Test of the tubes by Chief of Detectives Antles of the Lincoln police, who has taken charge of the investigation, failed to prove the presence of explosives. Three inches of cement plugged one end of each tube. Some harmless substance partially filled the remainder of each of the pipes, which were three feet in length.

Rumors of a bomb plot were general today, but Chief Antles is inclined to discount the reports. If the tubes contained explosives, he believes it to be the work of a practical joker. The pipes were from some discarded brass railing used in the state library.

State officials hold the view that the tubing was accidentally placed in the furnace, and when heated air expansion caused the explosion of one of the pipes.

German Banker Is Committed by New York Federal Judge

NEW YORK, Feb. 24.—Federico Stallforth, a Mexican-German banker, was ordered today committed to the custody of the United States marshal by Federal Judge Dayton for refusing to answer questions before the federal grand jury which is investigating the efforts of German agents to foment trouble between this country and Mexico and to instigate strikes in munitions factories.

Stallforth was closely associated, it is said, with Franz von Rintelen, the reputed head of the German propaganda in the United States, who fled from the country under a false passport when the federal authorities began to investigate his activities.

Stallforth is the head of a German-Mexican bank with headquarters at Parral, Mex. While Von Rintelen was in this country he maintained headquarters in Stallforth's office in this city. A mass of documents taken from Von Rintelen by the English authorities and turned over to the State department proved, according to federal officers, that German agents had spent large sums of money in Mexico.
