WEAK into a disinfecting finid at the cost of 8

NEW YORK, Feb. 25.-Opening with some show of strength under the lead of Reading and American Locomotive, which soon rose 2 points each, today's brief mar-ket gradually yielded to increasing pres-sure, which emanated iargely from pre-fessional sources. Land Survey Made by Geo. Washintgon in State of Virginia


Last week The Bee printed a reproduction of one of George Washington's real catate advertisements.

George Washington's records of his surreying were as interesting as his real estate advertisements. Irenaeus Shuler of Shuler & Cary has returned from a visit to his old home in Page county, Virginia, where he sold a part of the old family estate. He brought with him the original deeds of two tracts of this land totaling some 300 or 400 acres. The deed describes the tract according to the survey made of that territory by George Washington.


