EAT STRAW BERRIES; CHEAP IN FEW WEEKS

Gardens in Louisiana Riot of Blooms and Proliferous Crop Expected.

FIFTY CENTS A BOX NOW

Strawberries at 15 cents a box three weeks from now.

Doesn't that sound like the real har-inger of spring. Those are the words of the manager of one of the big Omaha grocers.

The strawberry gardens of Louisiana are a riot of blooms now," he said.

"Florida potatoes are here. These are fine tubers and they are of fine quality and are a pound.

"Peas are here from Florida. Fine, sweet, crisp and with an aroma as they have been freshly picked from the vines.

"Wax beans and string beans, also from sunny Florida are of superlative quality.

Head lettuce, great, large, well-blended heads are on the market in plenty.

"Rhubarb from the nearby hothouses is forcing the California article somewhat from the market and you can get a big bunch of the succulent stalks for a dime.

"If you have a taste for French endives they cost you just \$1 a pound now.

These are the genuine imported article and 90 cents of the price is put there by the war, because imported endives in the days of peace sold in Omaha at 60 cents a pound.

Domestic endives are plentiful at a nickel a bunch.

"Very fine cantaloupes or 'kid glove oranges' are on the market, sweet and of fine aroma.

The first of the Cuban pineapples to reach the Omaha market this spring arrived this week. They are extra fine.

The egg market is tumbling as the recent warm weather had its effect on Madame Hen and she poured a perfect avalanche of her 'fruit' upon the public counters.

Lent Will Soon Be Here; Tasteful Lenten Dishes

As the Lenten season rolls around once more, the housekeeper is interested in meatless cookery and in dishes that will add variety to the daily menu.

There are some that are well worth trying:

LUNCHEON CHEESE. Four cups of bread crumbs, two cups of milk, one-half cup of melted butter.

Heat bread crumbs and milk. When hot add cheese, and season to taste with salt and pepper.

Remove from fire and stir until cheese is melted.

BAKED PEAS. One pound dried peas, one large onion, two tablespoons of butter.

Soak peas several hours and then boil until tender. Peel onion and chop fine.

Fry to a pale brown in butter. Mix with peas, which have been well drained, and turn into a buttered baking dish.

Pour over enough white sauce to cover the surface. Sprinkle with crumbs and grate cheese, dot with tiny bits of butter and brown in a hot oven for a few minutes.

BAKED BEAN SOUP. One quart baked beans, one cup strained tomatoes, one onion, two quarts water, three tablespoons of butter, three tablespoons of flour, salt and pepper.

Cook beans, tomatoes, sliced onion and water until beans are soft.

Put through a strainer. Melt butter, add flour and cook a few minutes, then add gradually the rest of the soup. Season to taste with pepper and salt.

CURRIED FISH FLAKES. One tablespoon of finely chopped onion, two tablespoons of flour, two tablespoons of curry powder, two tablespoons of butter, one-quarter teaspoonful paprika, one cup milk, two cups fish flakes.

Melt butter and cook onion in it until softened and yellowed.

Put through a strainer. Melt butter, add flour and cook a few minutes, then add gradually the rest of the soup. Season to taste with pepper and salt.

flakes, mix and let stand to become hot, serve with hot boiled rice.

SCALLOPED CHESTNUTS. One pint chestnuts (before shelling), one cup milk, one small onion, two tablespoons of butter, salt and pepper, bread crumbs.

Remove shells from chestnuts and boil in water for ten minutes, then drain and remove skins.

Cook them in the milk, to which the chopped onion and salt and pepper has been added, for half an hour.

Then drain, saving the milk, mash and rub the nuts through a colander.

Season with one tablespoonful of the butter and salt and pepper to taste.

Add three tablespoonfuls of the milk, in which the chestnuts were stewed.

Put mixture in a buttered baking dish, cover with bread crumbs and dot with small pieces of the remaining tablespoonful of butter.

Brown in a hot oven for a few minutes.

EGGS AU GRATIN. Six hard cooked eggs, one and one-half cups milk, one and one-half cups stale bread crumbs, one-half cup of melted butter.

Remove shells from eggs and cut in quarters lengthwise.

Place in a buttered baking dish and sprinkle grated cheese between the layers.

Pour white sauce over the eggs, cover with crumbs, sprinkle with cheese and brown in the oven.

Serve hot.

FISH FLAKES WITH GREEN PEPPER. One and three-fourths cups fish flakes, one small green pepper, one cup milk, two tablespoons of butter, two tablespoons of flour, one teaspoonful finely chopped onion, bit of bay leaf, sprig of parsley, salt and pepper.

Cut a slice from the stem and of the pepper, remove every seed and parboil fifteen minutes.

Scald the milk with the parsley and bay leaf. Cook the onion in the butter three minutes, add flour, cook a few minutes and then add milk, salt and pepper.

When thickened and smooth, add fish flakes and pepper cut into narrow strips.

Heat thoroughly. Serve with brown bread sandwiches.
