The local baby health exhibit, undertaken by the Omaha Woman's club to carry out the work of the General Federation in connection with the federal children's bureau, opens at the court house Saturday morning at 10 o'clock and will continue for one week. Mrs. K. R. J. Edholm, health chairman; Mrs. F. J. Hiras, civic chairman, and Mrs. F. J. Burnett of the home economics department of the club are in charge of the exhibit.

All women's organizations of the city have joined in the movement, either by preparing programs or acting as hostesses, or both. Members of the Woman's club will be on duty all week, mornings and afternoons, with members of the Association of Collegiate Alumnae and Young Women's Christian association in attendance evenings. Mrs. J. N. Paul of St. Paul, state federation president, will come here for the opening exercises.
