Lightweight Champion Posted \$250 Forfeit Money with The Bee that He'll Meet Anybody.

CHOOSES JOHNNY BILLITER

Ray Page, who controls the affairs of Owen Daily, the lightweight wrestling champion of the world, blew into Omaha yesterday and proceeded to write a few checks. Page saw in a local paper a few days ago an article that spoke of Johnny Billiter in more or less glowing terms. Some time ago Daily twisted the tail of Mr. Billiter and Page can't figure where Billiter stands to receive any flowers when Daily dies.

Accordingly Mr. Page scribbled a check for the sum of \$250, resister, American money, and deposited it with the sporting-editor of The Bee. "This \$250," said Page, "is forfeit money that Owen Daily will wrestle Johnny Billiter, winner-take-all, any old time. Billiter is willing. LOS ANGELES, March 6.—Eddie Pullen won the George Washington sweepstake, a 100-mile automobile race, which was the feature event at the opening here today of the new Ascot speedway. His time was 1:30:42. Bob Burman finished second and Earl Cooper was third. Their time was 1:32:41 and 1:32:44, respectively. For the greater part of the distance the race was between Pullen and Cooper, with one or the other leading the field up to the eighteenth lap, when Pullen forged ahead. TOLEDO, O., March 6.—Faster work than has ever marked the early performance in a national tournament was shown here today when the minor events of the American Bowling congress got under way. W. H. The changes made in the previous propositions are that the company agrees that at the end of the five-year period of a proposed contract the city may purchase the equipment of the street lighting system upon the appraisal plan, whether the city wishes to operate a municipal plant or merely own the equipment and buy current from the company. The company made no offer to furnish current at this time on the basis that the city install its own equipment. It is proposed in this revised proposition that the company print street names on the lamps.
