The changes made in the previous propositions are that the company agrees that at the end of the five-year period of proposed contract the city may purchase the equipment of the street lighting system upon the appraisal plan. whether the city wishes to operate a municipal plant or merely own the equipment and buy current from the com-

The company made no offer to furnish current at this time on the basis that the city install its own equipment. It is proposed in this revised proposition that the company print street names on the
