

NEW UNION DEPOT NEEDED AT ONCE

Present Structure Entirely Inadequate to Handle Needs of City, Which Deserves Better.

FIRST IMPRESSION IS BAD

Omaha business men without exception are with The Bee in its demand for better union depot facilities in Omaha. When interviewed upon the subject, without hesitation they express their opinions, all being unanimous in their conviction that the union depot here is not in keeping with the importance of the business interests of the city.

Many of the business men when interviewed point to the fact that scattered all over the United States, cities nowhere as large as Omaha and none of them doing the volume of business transacted by this city, have union stations that are far superior in all respects. The business men here when approached upon the subject of a union station, point to the fact that the one here is out of date, totally inadequate and worst of all is a continual bad advertisement for strangers passing through the city.

The following are the opinions of low business men of the city look upon the depot situation as it exists at this time:

Railroads Good Waiters.

Edwin S. Jewell—Most of people now living in Omaha will be dead before we ever get a Union depot here. If the railroads are as slow about it as they were in Chicago. The Illinois Central there had an old shack of a depot for many, many years, that would not have made a decent cow shed. Railroads figure that a depot is a dead expense and that if they build the finest depot in the world, not one more passenger will ride their lines by reason of the new depot. So they wait just as long as they can before building.

C. S. Hayward—The present so-called Union depot here is wholly inadequate for the purposes for which it is intended and it is a shame that a city of the size and importance of Omaha has to put up with it. There are few cities of half the size of Omaha that do not have better Union depot facilities. It is a back number, antiquated style and not only much too small, but entirely out of date.

Auto Dealers' Views.

W. E. Foshier—With the business that Omaha is giving the railroads it is too bad that they do not appreciate it to at least the extent of giving the city a union station that would at least be respectable. To people entering a city their impression is generally formed by the front that is put up. Enter Omaha from any direction and be landed at the Union depot and the front that is presented leads one to the belief that the city is run down and of little importance. They get this idea from the Union depot that is little more than a shed—a depot that would be a disgrace to a city of 25,000 inhabitants. Here we have a city of 200,000 or more, one of the most active and energetic in the country, and still we are forced to put up with whatever the railroads see fit to give us in the way of a union station. I believe it is high time for the Commercial club, the improvement clubs, the other civic organizations and the citizens generally to take some action in the premises. We ought to get together and present a solid front and demand a union station that would be a credit to Omaha. Either place it on the present site or somewhere else, but let us unite in our demands and insist upon a depot that would be commensurate with the importance of the city. Omaha has been pretty good to the railroads and it is high time they commenced being good to Omaha.

All Should Work Together.

W. E. Foshier—We ought to have a better union depot, and I believe that if the people will get behind a movement, handled in the right way, the railroads will give us what we are entitled to in the premises. We are pouring money into the railroad treasuries and they ought to reciprocate to the extent of erecting a structure here that would be a credit to the city. They have done it elsewhere, and there is no reason why they should not do something for Omaha. Omaha has never asked the railroads for much, and now it is high time that we get together and make our demands and then follow them up. We will never accomplish anything by sitting around waiting for the railroads to take the initiative. There is no city that I know of that does not have a much better depot than Omaha. The depot that we do have is of such a character that it gives strangers passing through on the trains a bad impression of the city, to say nothing of its being entirely inadequate to our needs.
