

"The Board of Directors of the Metropolitan Water District of the City of Omaha, in response to a resolution of the mayor and council, adopted February 1916, inviting bids for the furnishing of electric current and for the equipment for street lighting, etc., begs leave to inform you that it is advised by its counse that the Metropolitan Water District under exsiting law, has not the power to construct and operate an electric light plant. However, if the legislature changes the Metropolitan Water District law, enabling the water district to purchase quipment and sell electricity and the city is still in a position to do its own street lighting the Water district will be able to perform the service requested.

"In conclusion the, Board of Directors wishes to assure you that it stands ready co-operate with you in every way within its power to accomplish a real reduction in electric light rates in Omaha.
