OMAHA'S CHANCES IN TOURNEY GOOD

Wins Over University Place Five by Single Point in Fast Combat.

SOUTH HIGH TAKES ITS GAME

LINCOLN, March 9.—(Special).—Only a little bit of carelessness can prevent Coach Mulligan and his fast Central High five of Omaha from carrying off the championship of Nebraska high schools in the "Class A" division of the big tournament being conducted under the auspices of the state university. Only "Class A" and "Class C" games are again taken up late this afternoon, with the third round in the "Class A" division scheduled for tonight.

Then all "Class A" teams will have a rest until tomorrow night, when the semi-finals will be reached. The six teams, that will enter the finals in the three divisions, will have an opportunity to rest all day Saturday and enter the finals at the City Auditorium in the best of condition.

Tight Squeak for Omaha.

Omaha can thank her stars that the University Place five grew a little careless this morning in the deciding three minutes of play in the second half. The University Place five held Omaha to a tie score in the first half, 2 to 2, and then came back with a rush and piled up a lead of 7 to 3, which they held until three minutes before the final whistle. Maxwell flipped a lucky basket and then Paynter followed with a pretty field goal, while running at full speed. With the score tied and two minutes more to play, University Place again woke up and fought desperately, but a little roughness resulted in a free throw for Patty, which he quickly converted into a goal, and which gave the Omaha lads the deciding point of the game, that ended, 8 to 7.

Close Call for Lincoln.

Lincoln also suffered a close call in the second round, when the Osceola five took a lead of 7 to 1, and held it until the opening of the second half. Then the Lincoln five got to going and smothered their opponents. Plattsburgh six, in the third round, y-beating Hebron, 14 to 10, and the Crete five, which is expected to be one of the final contenders, put the Shelton team out after a hard fight, 13 to 10. South Omaha and Hastings fought it out in a close guarding game, with the Packers finally nursing ahead, 5 to 3. Columbus and Newman Grove were evenly matched, but the more accurate goal shooting of Columbus finally decided the game in its favor, 13 to 9.

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ADVANCE MAN IS IN THE CITY

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Uses Breadknife to Cut Up Man Who Ran Over Dog with Auto

A hurry-up call to the police station at 5:05 o'clock yesterday evening sent the wagon and officers to the Standard Cleaning company's shop at 115 South Thirteenth street, where Frank Anzlowe, a laborer, giving his address as 723 South Twelfth street, had stabbed and seriously wounded George Hladik, a driver for the Standard Cleaning company, after the latter had run over Anzlowe's dog and killed it.

Anzlowe confessed to the local police that he was the man that had committed the deed, stating that he used a bread-knife he had carried from his home in the morning to get sharpened for the weapon.

The knife entered Hladik's body on the left side and striking a rib, turned upward, cutting a slit four and one-half inches long. The injured man was taken to Dr. J. Nemeo, nearby, where his wound was dressed.

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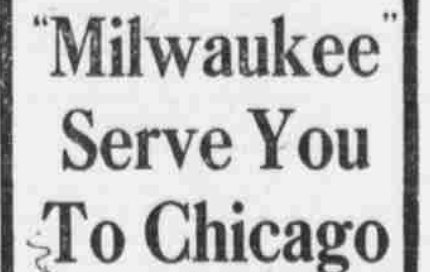
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
