SOLDIERS RETURN TO THE BOUNDARY

American Troopers Pursuing Villa Bandits Come Back After Fighting Three Battles.

THIS REPORTED TO FUNSTON

SAN ANTONIO, Tex., March 10,---Major Frank Tompkins, commanding the detachment of American troops, which pursued General Villa and his bandits into Mexico after the attack yesterday at Columbus, charge through the camp. Our troops N. M., have returned to the border after engaging in three running fights with the Mexicans, who finally made a stand which stopped the advance of the American soldiers.

This information was conveyed tonight to Major General Frederick Funston, commanding the Southern department, United States army, in an official report on the situation from Colonel H. J. Slocum in command at Columbus.

Text of Report. Following is the text of Colone: Blocum's report, as given out by General Funston at Fort Sam Houston:

"When Villa's troops fell back before daylight, we followed them with a disounted line. At the same time I sent Major Tompkins with three troops mounted to attack. Tompkins followed them for about five miles into Mexico. having three running fights with them and they finally made a stand with their entire force and stopped Tompkins advance and he returned here. We had one corporal killed in the pursuit. The Mexicans dropped considerable

material and loot that they had gotten in town. I am reliably informed it was Villa who made the attack with 1300 men, leaving about 1,000 on the river east

took this opportunity to attack.
"He intended capturing the town, looting the bank and killing all Americans. Our casualties were five wounded, seven killed. Lieutenant Renson was shot in the arm, Captain Williams, adjutant, received a alight wound in the hand. Eight civillans were killed in the town, including

Hury Twenty-Seven Mexicans. We have already buried twenty-seven Mexican soldiers, most of them killed in the camp, some near the bank and there are many other dead Mexicans on Villa's

line of retreat about one mile west. "Mexican troops under Villa's personal mmand and by his orders, made the turned out quickly and drove the Mexicans out, killing seventeen in or about the camp. About ten or twelve Mexicans were killed in the town. While our people at that time in the morning surprised they did their work well. Villa's attempt to charge the camp and town was a complete failure.

"I recommend one battalion of infantry, one squadron of the Eighth cavalry to be sent here and that the mounted troops be used to follow up Villa, leaving the infantry to protect the town.

U NITED STATES ASKS ENGLAND FOR DATA

Wants Copy of Confidential Instructions to Commanders of Merchantmen.

DENIAL OF GERMAN CHARGES

WASHINGTON, March 10 .- The United States has asked Great Britain for a copy of the confidential instructions to commanders of British merchant vessels, which Germany claims prove that merchantmen armed ostensibly for defensive purposes have orders to act offensively against German and Austran submarines.

The request is understood to have been made today through Sir Cecil Spring-Rice, the British ambassador.

This is the first step the United States has taken since the administration officials have been studying the complete memorandum in which Germany announced its intention to treat as warships armed merchantmen of the entente allies, its appendices, and the subsequent memoranda on the subject submitted by Count von Bernstorff, the German ambassador.
