THE STORY OF THE SUBMARINE. By Farnham Bishop. New York City. The Century Company.

A full account of the history and achievements of the most spectacular machine of modern times—the submarine. The author recounts the romantic labors of Robert Fulton, who was prouder of his submarine fighting plans than of his steamboat; and of Simon Lake, David Bushnell, John P. Holland and others.

THE MARTYRS RETURN. By Percival W. Wells. New York City. Bartlett Publishing Company. \$1.00.

Mr. Wells has here given us much to think of. A great amount of thought is condensed into a hundred pages. Describes a conversation between Lincoln and General Hazard, a veteran of the civil war. The author is severe on some phases of the social question, but endeavors to cover the ground broadly.

THE ABYSS. By Nathan Kuesy. New York. The Macmillan Company.

Being the adventures from childhood to manhood, showing the misfortunes and temptations which befall the hero, all drawing him down into the abyss. This is the second volume of the epic of the streets entitled "Children of the Abyss."

DRIFTING WATERS. By Rachel Swete McNamara. New York. \$1.25. G. P. Putnam's Sons.

The rebellion of a young girl, budding into womanhood, against the jealous proprietorship of a mother's love. The daughter's fancy is in time caught in the meshes of love, and the clandestine expression of her attachment, which the circumstances demand, involves developments of far reaching interest to the unfolding of the story. The scene is in part England and in part Egypt—the haunting, glowing, throbbing Egypt that the author has again made so real.

GRETRUDE AND I. Translated by Adele Lewald. New York. The International Monthly. \$1.00 net.

This book does not deal with the war and is a charming and simple tale of musical Germany. It contains a fine love story and reveals a phase of modern German life absolutely unknown to most Americans.
