Need Not Fight if It Hurts Conscience

(Correspondence of the Associated Press.)

LONDON, Feb. 23.—The position of the conscientious objector under the new military compulsion act is thus stated in a circular issued to the local authorities: "The man who honestly and as a matter of conscience objects to combatant service is entitled to exemption. While care will be taken that the man who shirks his duty to his country does not find unworthy shelter behind this provision, every consideration will be given to the man whose objections genuinely rest on religious or moral convictions. The local authority, in making appointments to the exemption tribunal, should bear in mind that the tribunal will have to hear, among the applications, those made on the ground of conscientious objection. Men who apply on this ground should be able to feel that they are being judged by a tribunal that will deal fairly with their cases."

BREAK LAW 6,000 YEARS OLD

Babylonian Decree Set Aside for a Child by Missouri's High Court.

The supreme court has declared void a Babylonian law of 238 B. C., which provided that the child of an adopted person had no rights as an heir after the death of the parent, decreeing Louis Bernero, 11 years old, as heir to property said to be worth \$2,000,000. The court announced the new doctrine that the natural child of an adopted child inherits from the adopting parents.

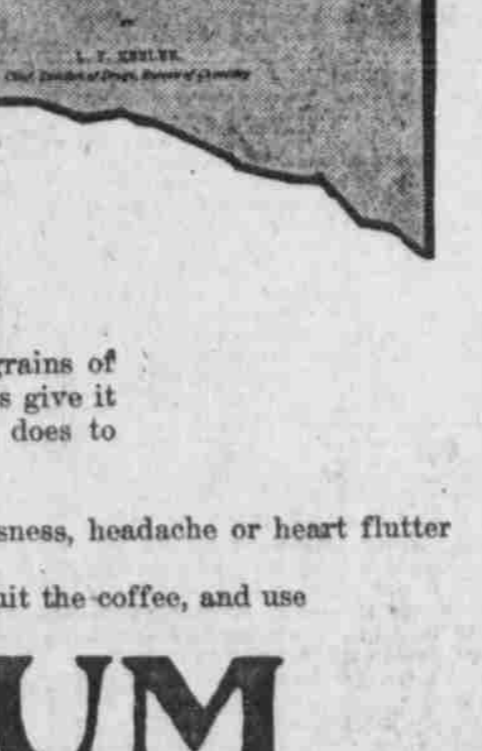
