CAVALRY CAMP AT COLONIA DUBLAN

Column from Hachita Arrives at Mormon Settlement Adjoining City of Casas Grandes.

GATEWAY TO GALENA REGION

EL PASO, Tex., March 18.—Francisco Villa is in the neighborhood of Las Cruces, 110 miles south of Casas Grandes, according to information received today by General Gabriel Gavra, Carranza commander at Juarez.

EL PASO, Tex., March 18.—American cavalrymen were camped at dawn today at Colonia Dublan, one of the environs of Casas Grandes. They arrived in the night. Through Colonia Dublan runs the road to the Galena district, twenty-five miles southeast, where Villa was last definitely reported.

The news of the encampment at Colonia Dublan dispelled fears of all disputes with constitutionalist authorities over what position the American troops should occupy at Casas Grandes. Mormon scout outsiders dashed into Colonia Dublan last night with news that the Americans were near. The column which was first into this important American settlement was said to be the cavalry from Hachita.

New Problem Arises. A new problem faced the American troops in Mexico as they entered the region where Villa's trail is scarcely three days' old. This problem came, not from the Villa chase, but from the attitude of the Carranza authorities that they did not wish the Americans to occupy any Mexican city.

In making his announcement that he had asked the Americans not to enter or occupy Casas Grandes, the city whose possession means safety to the American Mormon colonists of that region, General Gabriel Gavra, commandant at Juarez, expressed no vexation at the presence of troops in his territory, but he was very firm in his announcement that under his present instructions from General Carranza he has no power to modify the orders to his troops against permitting the occupation of cities. The general offered no comment on what he would do provided the American troops occupied a Mexican city.

Dispatches direct from Mexico and the official announcement from Major General Funston made it evident today that the two American columns, one from Columbus, N. M., under General Pershing, and the other from Hachita, N. M., under Colonel Dodd, had gotten into close communication with each other, and probably had formed an actual junction when a little more than half way on the route to Casas Grandes.

Strategy Becoming Apparent

Something of the strategy of the dash on Villa's trail also was apparent. The Hachita column made its actual start from San Bernardino ranch, which is in the little square of territory about the size of a large county, where the state of New Mexico extends some forty miles south of the general east and west line of the American border. By using this American territory for the first part of the cavalry column from Hachita, the flying command of Colonel George Dodd was able to strike into Mexico at the shortest distance from Casas Grandes, a little more than sixty miles of march. The main column under General Pershing at Columbus, N. M., starting from a point considerably further distant from Casas Grandes, did not go due south, but apparently veered to the westward to get into touch with the cavalry command from Hachita. Reports here that Pershing's army intended to establish a base at Guzman were discounted in dispatches yesterday that Guzman was still held by Carranza troops and that the American columns were marching about twenty-five miles to the westward. This would put them very close to the route of the cavalry command of Colonel Dodd. Guzman is an important constitutionalist garrison town, about thirty miles directly south of the point where General Pershing entered Mexico, and by going past it to the west no question of occupation was raised.

McNISH OBJECTS TO REED ON BALLOT

Republican Chairman Files His Formal Protest to Name on Ticket.

REED SEES REPUBLICAN WIN

(From a Staff Correspondent.) LINCOLN, March 18.—(Special Telegram.)—A protest was filed this morning by J. C. McNish, chairman of the republican state committee against the placing of the name of Attorney General Reed upon the primary ballot as a candidate for the republican nomination for attorney general.

McNish's Protest. Mr. McNish says: "Judging from the purported interview which Mr. Reed gave out in Lincoln, it would seem that he now construes the primary law in a different light, regardless of the fact that he has filed an acceptance as a democrat, and it would seem he anticipated that he would slip in as a republican candidate without filing an acceptance. I do not believe the voters of Nebraska will look with favor on such politics and mode of procedure in holding office. Mr. Reed undoubtedly sees the writing on the wall which appears to be a sweeping republican victory." He filed a long formal protest.

Pool Sustains Protest. Secretary of State Pool this afternoon sustained the protest filed by Chairman McNish of the republican state committee of the name of Attorney General Reed, a democrat, from appearing on the republican primary ballot.

It will now be up to Mr. Reed to manhandle the secretary of state in an effort to get his name on the ballot, but it will probably not be done, as Mr. Reed has said that if there was an objection made to his accepting the filing he would not do so.

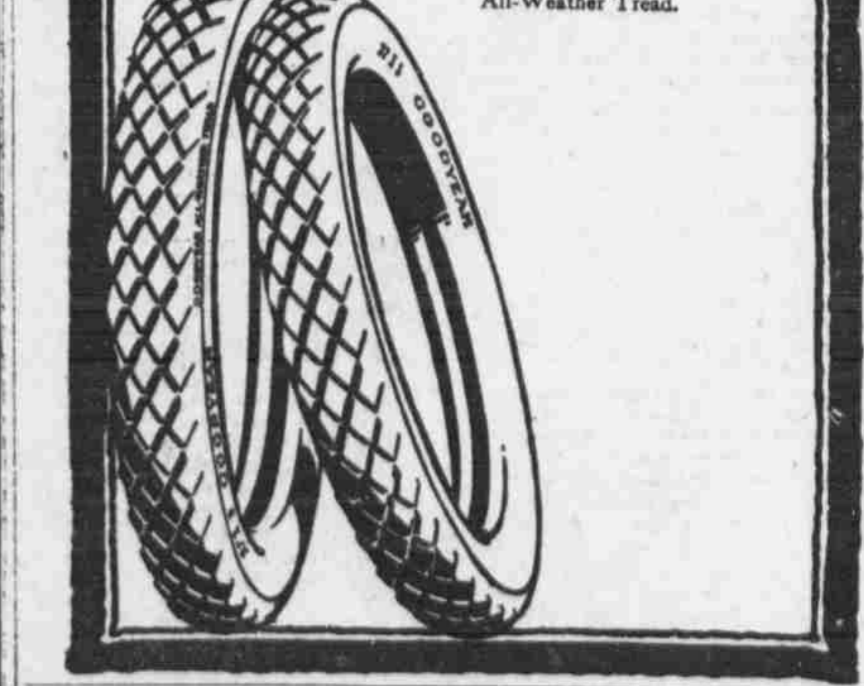
