

Teacher Must Know Things.

Some of these points were mentioned by the professor in his talk on "The Teaching of German in the Elementary Schools." He mentioned some of these things to show that there is order, system and reason back of the German gender, and the origin of the words and forms, contrary to the opinion of some teachers who are not sufficiently familiar with their subject.

"In the high school the academically trained teacher is absolutely necessary to teach German," he asserted. "The teacher must know Latin and must know the grammar of various languages, for he or she must be able to compare the German, English and Latin grammar."




