From start to finish wheat prices were ruled chiefly by selling, which resulted from European suggestions that the end of hostilities was perhaps not altogether remote. Liverpool dispatches asserted that rumors of peace were regarded lightly by British traders, but the fact that quotations from Liverpool showed a notably decline was generally construed here as more accurate indicating the real outlook. Week end prefit taking by shorts led to some slight railies in the wheat market, but none that seemed to be of a lasting sort. About the only export sale heard of was 100,001 bushels in Chicago.
