Hall, who died on a farm near Tama, Ia., at the age 85 years, by County Judge Crawford, The Hall estate, it is believed, is in the neighbordhood of \$100,000 and most of this amount will probably be turned over to heirs living in Douglas county. Included in the estate is a collection of human skeletons.
