BUT POOR DEMAND FOR CORN

OMAHA, March 22, 1916. The wheat market was very steady today. The receipts continued light and with only a fair demand, wheat sold unchanged to one-half higher.

Corn was very steady, selling unchanged to lower. The receipts of corn totaled thirty-four cars and there was a poor demand.

Barley and rye were quoted unchanged. Clearances were: Wheat, 100,000 bu., equal to 90,000 bu.; corn, 50,000 bu., equal to 45,000 bu.

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Kreisler's Art Eludes Definition of

Those Who Are Thereby Enthralled

Fritz Kreisler, violinist, who will close the charity concert course in his capital at the Auditorium Tuesday evening, March 22, seems to be the only artist of our time concerning whom connoisseurs, professional and lay, are unanimous.

But Mr. Kreisler's technical skill, which discloses itself so spontaneously, apparently so unpremeditatedly, and which never obtrudes itself as an end, is by no means the greatest item of his unsurpassable art.
