Franklin Farmers Endorse Men for The Legislature

UPLAND, Neb., March 22--(Special.)--At a meeting of the Franklin County Farmers' union, held in Hildreth Friday, a full legislative ticket was nominated. M. O. Munson of Upland received the endorsement for democratic senatorial candidate; A. T. Heady of Riverton, the endorsement for republican candidate. For the legislature Albert Albers of Hildreth was endorsed as republican candidate and David McCracken of Macon as democratic candidate.

As a result of the entry of the union into politics a hurried consultation of leading democrats was called and Editor Robinson of the Upland Eagle agreed to withdraw so that the commercial vote could be concentrated. As both Messrs. Samuelson and Spawm refused to withdraw there will still be a three-cornered race, with the odds greatly in favor of Mr. Munson, the union man.

For county judge the only candidates so far are Thomas Robertson (incumbent); J. Kline of Bloomington and Charles Davis of Franklin.

There are no progressive candidates in the county this year and the split in the republican ranks seems to be entirely closed up.
