

INDIANS NO LONGER FOLLOW WARPATH

Rosebud Sioux of the Spotted Tail Tribe Have Now Become a Race of Farmers.

MODERN HOMES AND SCHOOLS

It was only about a quarter of a century ago that the Rosebud Sioux, in those days better known as the Spotted Tail Indians, laid down the tomahawk and the scalping knife and turned their attention to more peaceful pursuits...

That these Indians, of whom there are now about 5,000, have made good, is the assertion of Harrie L. Davis, superintendent, who has looked after their welfare during the last two years.

Returning from Washington, Mr. Davis en route home to the agency at Rosebud, S. D., spent several hours in Omaha last Friday. While here he discussed on Indians, particularly the Rosebud Sioux, saying:

Work of Self-Supporting. Of the 5,500 Indians of the Rosebud agency, fully 3,000 are self-supporting and most of them are as good citizens as you can find anywhere.

That they are thrifty is borne out by the fact that in the banks in the towns close to their lands they have more than \$200,000 in deposits.

When I went to the agency I worked on the idea of bringing about a development of the Indians and introducing the idea of independence among them and I think that I have succeeded.

On the agency we have three boarding and twenty day schools, but there are not enough to supply the demand upon them.

We have done away with the old tribal relations to a great extent and now business that was looked after by the chiefs is conducted by a council, the members of which are elected.

At this time most of the Indian land is fenced and fenced with wire and posts, and in these inclosures during the summer the Indians pasture their stock.

Some of the white men living close to our lands have married Indian girls, but we are not encouraging the intermarrying of the races.

With the exception of the oldest men of the tribe, all of our Indians are rapidly acquiring the ways of the whites and are dropping the Indian customs.

How to Build a Bird House that Will Stand Weather

The interest taken in the enterprise of furnishing detached homes and apartment houses for the feathered friends who will flourish during the summer in and around Omaha is spreading at a rapid rate.

Almost anybody with a few tools and skill in using them can tack together the bits of board needed to provide a habitable shelter for a bird.

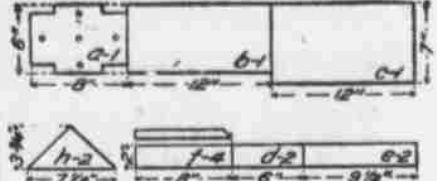


Fig. 2 - Lumber diagrams for building a house shown in figure 1. Thickness of boards, 3/4 inch.

large branch, hollowed by decay, and fitted with a top and bottom as illustrated in the figure.

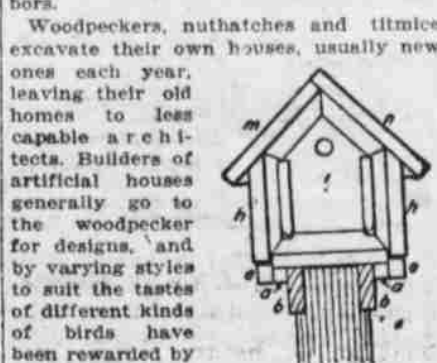


Fig. 3 - Diagrammatic drawings of bluebird house. This house can be removed from its floor by unfastening two wire hooks.

It can be cleaned by simply lifting the box from its base. Birds, and wrens, as well as swallows, nest in this style of house.

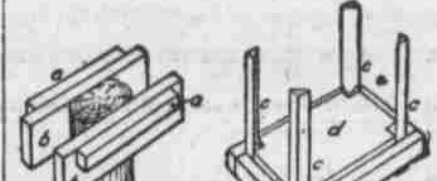


Fig. 4 - Foundation for house shown in figure 3.

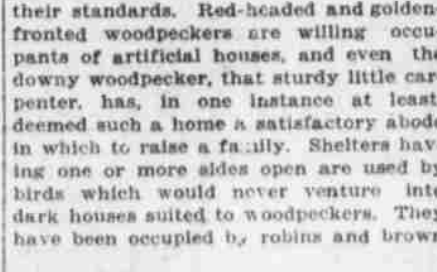


Fig. 5 - Floor and posts added to foundation shown in figure 4.

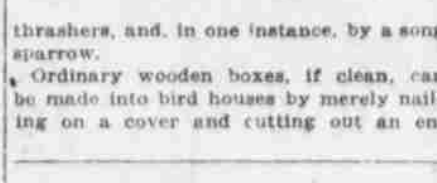


Fig. 6 - House ready to place over floor and posts as shown in figure 5.

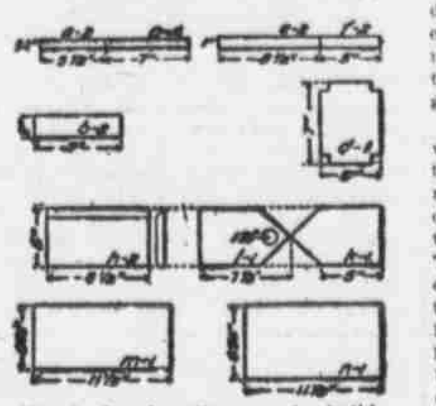


Fig. 7 - Lumber diagrams for building a house shown in figure 6. Thickness of boards, 3/4 inch.

Cats and large snakes are enemies of birds than any other mammal. Trees and poles supporting houses should be sheathed with tin or galvanized iron.

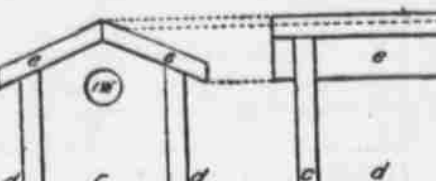


Fig. 8 - House to be placed in tree for woodpeckers, chickadees, nuthatches, or titmice.

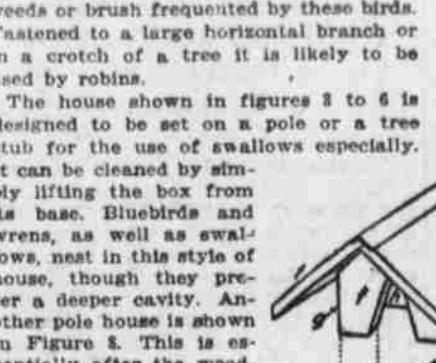


Fig. 9 - House for wrens and house finches. Roof broken to show interior.

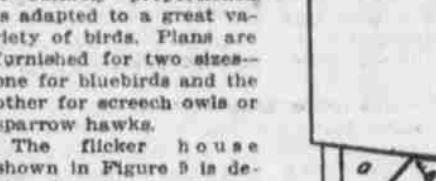


Fig. 10 - Lumber diagrams for flicker house shown in figure 9. Thickness of boards, 3/4 inch.

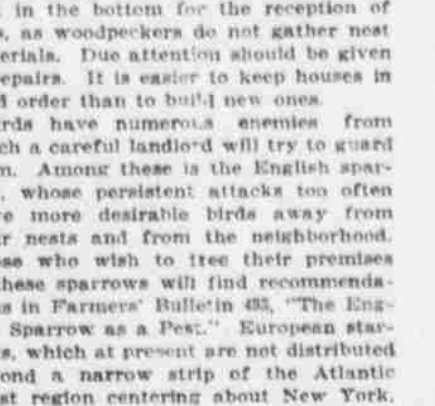


Fig. 11 - House to be placed in tree for woodpeckers, chickadees, nuthatches, or titmice.

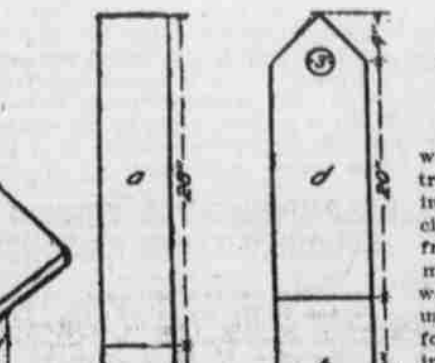


Fig. 13 - House for wrens and house finches. Roof broken to show interior.

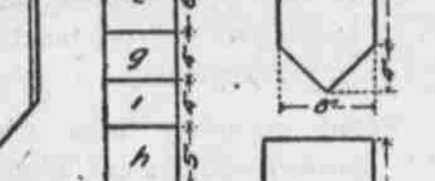


Fig. 14 - House for wrens and house finches. Roof broken to show interior.

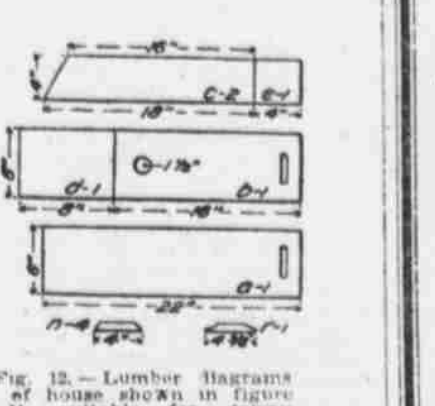


Fig. 15 - House for wrens and house finches. Roof broken to show interior.

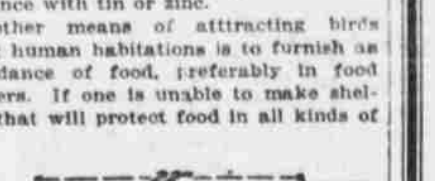


Fig. 16 - House for wrens and house finches. Roof broken to show interior.

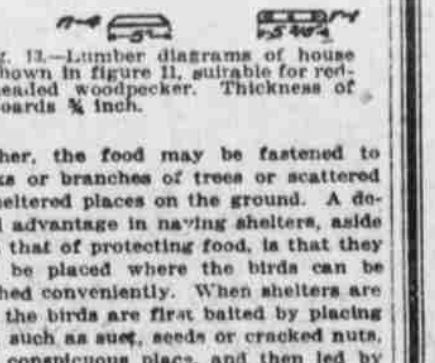


Fig. 17 - House for wrens and house finches. Roof broken to show interior.
