

### ATHLETIC CLUB PURCHASES LOT

Buy North West Corner of Nineteenth and Douglas for Site of Eight-Story Building.

### WILL BE ERRECTED THIS YEAR

The Omaha Athletic club, through its board of directors, has purchased the northwest corner of Nineteenth and Douglas streets, where a club house will be erected at a cost of \$400,000 this year.

W. A. Fraser, president of the club, is now in the east, where he is looking over club houses for construction ideas. As soon as he shall have returned, the directors will engage an architect and proceed with plans.

George Brandeis, one of the directors of the Omaha Athletic club, made this statement relative to this improvement:

"The building will be from eight to ten stories in height and will be occupied exclusively by the club. It will be an up-to-date club in every particular and will mean much to Omaha. The details of the building have not been worked out, but it may be said there will be such features as swimming pool, baths, dining rooms for men and women and other facilities for social and athletic activities. It is intended to make this a club for women as well as men and in preparing the plans the women will be kept in mind. Members who live at the club will have all accommodations found in a first-class hotel."

The Omaha Athletic club was organized a few weeks ago. The directors are: W. A. Fraser, F. W. Judson, George Brandeis, George Haverstick, A. W. Jeffers and Nelson Uplike.

### HOG CHOLERA IS AT LOWEST EBB

So Few Cases Are Now Found that Serum Concerns Find But Little Sale.

### NO DOUBT OF ITS EFFICACY

In direct line with the inevitable prophecy made a few years ago by hog breeders and experts in the porcine stocks in the corn belt, the hog cholera serum manufacturing business has become a survival of the fittest.

With hog cholera at a very low ebb—a condition that is evident every decade following a high wave of the disease—the serum companies in the big packing centers are running along noticeably bearish lines—and quite a number have shut down entirely, authorities on the situation aver.

With the introduction of hog serum a few years ago and its joyously welcomed introductions on the part of hog breeders in its success in checking and eradicating cholera, serum manufacturing concerns sprung up like mushrooms in all sections of the country, particularly in the middle west's great packing centers.

Although hog cholera serum has been used for about seven years, the extensive manufacture of serum did not start until approximately three years ago. As the serum and methods of vaccination became more and more perfected the wave of cholera steadily receded, with the result that at the present time the

disease among porkers is at practically its lowest point.

**Business Falls Off.**  
As hog cholera serum manufacturing concerns have not been benefited by the war, many of them, while still operating and finding a fair market for their product, are not by any means doing the "land office" business of a year or two ago.

Starting in the '80s, according to E. Z. Russell, associated editor of the Twentieth Century Farmer, the country has experienced a low wave of hog cholera every decade. These radical decreases in the ravages of the disease, he explained, had been preceded by a high wave of cholera.

Previous to the introduction of vaccination with serum the hogs which recovered from the cholera—about 50 per cent—were afterwards immune. Government statistics show that fully 92 per cent of well hogs properly vaccinated recover from cholera. Also, as a general thing, pigs from immune sows are immune up till the time they are weaned.

**Odd Fellows Dedication.**  
STOIX FALLS, S. D., March 29.—(Special Telegram)—Odd Fellows from Madison, Igan, Wentworth, Fladmark, Cent, Dell Rapids and Baltic gathered here today to assist the local Odd Fellows in dedicating a new \$35,000 temple building which was recently completed. The dedication exercises were conducted by Grand Master S. W. Rowley of Mitchell, assisted by prominent officers of the order from Sioux Falls and elsewhere in the state.

**Fremonters on Wrecked Train.**  
FREMONT, Neb., March 29.—(Special)—Mr. and Mrs. Frank Fowler and son James, well known Fremonters, were passengers on the New York Twentieth Century Limited train which was wrecked near Cleveland Wednesday morning. They escaped injury, according to a message received at Mr. Fowler's office.
