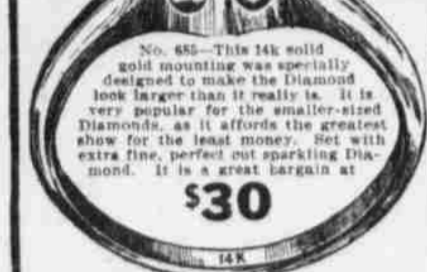

Secretary of State Gives Douglas Election Boss His View of Statutes.

FEENAN SENDS CALL FOR HELP

(From a Staff Correspondent.) LINCOLN, March 30.—(Special.)—If I can't get off of the ticket as a candidate for the Omaha Water board, I will lose my job," is the message which came to Secretary of State Pool this morning from Kibert F. Feenan of the metropolitan city of Nebraska.

The trouble all comes from the announcement of Election Commissioner Harley E. Moorhead of Douglas county that he will not permit any candidate to withdraw from the ticket who has already filed for the nomination for an office.

Secretary of State Pool takes an opposite view of the situation and construes the law to mean that the official with whom a certificate of nomination has been filed has authority to permit the candidate to withdraw upon proper showing. He has instructed Mr. Moorhead along those lines, calling his attention to the law as it is set forth in the statutes. The section covering this point reads: "Section 223. Declaration of Nomination.—Whenever any person nominated for public office, as in this article provided, shall, at least fifteen days before election, notify the officers by whom the original certificate of nomination was filed, or if nominated at a primary election, the secretary of state, and if to be voted for in one county alone, the county clerk of the county where such office is to be voted for, or a municipal officer, the clerk of the city or village, by a statement in writing by him and duly acknowledged, that he declines such nomination, the same shall be void, and his name shall not be printed upon the ballot, but no such declaration shall be received after the time above specified. The officer to whom such notification is given shall forthwith inform by mail or otherwise, one or more persons whose names are attached to the original certificate of nomination provided he was nominated by a convention or committee, or if nominated at a primary election, as provided for in this article, the chairman or secretary of the campaign or party committee of his political party, if there be one, and if not, at least three of the prominent members of his political party in the state, that he has declined a such nomination, by mailing or delivering to them personally notice of such fact, and three days shall be given such party committee or convention to propose a nominee to fill such vacancy (1907 p. 221; Ann. 1901; Comp. 3220)."

In the company were prominent citizens in every walk of life. The members of the Solomon Lodge, No. 10, of Fort Calhoun and Adoniram chapter, Jordan Commandery, Knight Templars of Blair had charge of the funeral.

NINE HUNDRED DOLLARS HIDDEN IN PIGEON HOLE

Three Children Die at North Platte

NORTH PLATTE, Neb., March 30.—(Special.)—An epidemic of measles and smallpox has been raging in this city for the last two months and in spite of determined efforts to stamp out the diseases, new cases are reported daily. The 10-month-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Joseph Hausher, who was recovering from an attack of measles, developed pneumonia and died last night. Louise, the 16-month-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. R. R. Oman, who had been sick with the measles, died during the night. The third death to occur last night was that of the 6-year-old daughter of H. B. Noble, and the cause in this case was pronounced diphtheria. The school which the child had been attending has been dismissed and will be thoroughly fumigated.

OMAHA UNION MAN MAKES TALK AT FREMONT

FREMONT, Neb., March 30.—(Special.)—Max Deszettel, editor of the Omaha Union-Labor under the auspices of the Central Labor union here Wednesday night, when members of the Men's Club, Commercial club, farmers' unions and other organizations were guests of the labor men. Mr. Deszettel told of the origin of the union label and urged all union men to demand goods that bear it. He declared that unions are opposed to war and that riots resulting from strikes are caused by agitators that have no place in unions. Other speakers on the program were E. R. Gurney, T. L. PASSES UP NATIONAL JOB

E. N. Vanhorn Notifies Board Will Not Become Bank Examiner for Uncle Sam. SALARY IS NOT LARGE ENOUGH. (From a Staff Correspondent.) LINCOLN, March 30.—(Special.)—E. N. Vanhorn, former state bank examiner who was appointed national bank examiner to take the place of Floyd Seydell, transferred to an eastern state, returned from Washington this morning with his commission and supplies, having passed the examination required. Mr. Vanhorn has finally decided, however, to pass up the national bank job and stick to the state job. He does this first because the salary as a national examiner is not enough larger than paid by the state to its state examiners to make him feel that he wants to take a bigger job. This morning he declined the appointment and notified the State Banking board that he would stick to the state job.

Greeley Will Pay Bonds. The State Board of Public Funds this morning declined to purchase refunding bonds of Greeley county. As a result Greeley county will take up the bonds. The county desired to refund the bonds at 4 1/2 per cent, but the state did not desire to take over bonds unless they were 5 per cent bonds, so the deal was then passed up.

Hewitt was elected delegate to the state convention that meets in Lexington, May 16 and 17. P. L. Hewitt, alternate. The camp was named Lexington camp, No. 112. This camp has as one of its members a veteran, who is also a son of a veteran, in the person of V. J. Hull. The camp was organized to aid the Grand Army of the Republic and woman's Relief corps, when they have their annual state encampment at Lexington, on May 15, 17, and 18.

The judges were President Crono of Hastings college, Superintendent Meyers of Geneva and Principal Lewis of Clay Center. The decision was two to one in favor of the affirmative.

BEATRICE, Neb., March 30.—(Special.)—Franklin and William Boyer, 8 and 4 years of age, respectively, sons of Mr. and Mrs. Oscar Boyer of this city, were run over by an automobile driven by John Welling of Plymouth, yesterday morning at the corner of Fifth and Court streets, and escaped with severe bruises. The boys started to cross the street and when Welling sounded the alarm they became confused and were knocked down and run over.

W. L. Stephens, formerly superintendent of schools at Beatrice and Lincoln, has been re-elected superintendent of the school at Long Beach, Cal., at a salary of \$4,000 per year.
