Bridal Procession Shown in Window of Brandeis Stores

Of the densely congested sidewalks on downtown streets on the opening night of the "Week of Wonderful Windows" there was none more crowded than those in front of the show windows of the Brandeis stores.

The "Passing Show" feature of the Brandeis windows, carried out with living models, furnished one of the most widely discussed innovations of the gala evening's many surprises.

The parade started with a passing in review of men and women in evening attire, and the best efforts of the most celebrated Parisian dressmakers could not have produced a more electrifying effect upon the audience. The men were groomed to the minute and presented the just-out-of-the-dressbox appearance which Jean Brunel was famous for a generation or so ago.

The second section of the show passed rapidly, disclosing men and women in afternoon dresses and attire, the men with street clothes and frock coats, silk hats and canes.

The third section was an exhibition of the most stylish of the outer garments for men and women and the most ambitious follower of fashion was performed amazed at the remarkable variety and charm of the garments shown.

Hold Election at Florence Tuesday

Tuesday will be election day in Florence and will be the culmination of a lively political battle that has been occupying the spotlight for the last two weeks.

For mayor, the republicans have nominated the present incumbent, P. E. Tucker, while the democrats have put Frank King in the race. James Fariss, a former councilman, is also out for the place by petition.

For city clerk, the present incumbent, John Bondesson, republican, has no opposition. For treasurer, E. L. Platz on the republican ticket is opposed by James Breneman on the democratic side. Clifford Kierle, republican, has no opposition for the job of city engineer.

For councilman in the north ward, James L. Johnson, the present member, has been renominated by the republicans, while the democrats have put up Charles Grigg. In the south ward there is a three-cornered fight between Basmus Larsen, democrat; George Foster, republican, and W. H. Thomas, the present councilman, who was defeated by George Foster in the primaries, but who has since filed by petition. The question of the legality of this filing has been raised, and in all probability will have to be threshed out in the courts.

SHAMP MISSES THE CLEVELAND WRECK

Changes Route Just in Time—Comes on Next Train and Sees All the Wreckage.

HAS SEVERAL CLOSE CALLS

C. L. Shamp of Omaha, secretary of the International Union of Stationary Firemen, is getting so that he almost expects to see a big wreck whenever he goes on a long railway journey.

He has had no less than three marvelous escapes from death in such wrecks.

His latest escape was on a trip to New York, from which he has just returned. Had he not received word while in New York to go to Detroit instead of direct to Chicago, he would have been in the Twentieth Century Limited that was mixed up in the big wreck near Cleveland, O., last Wednesday morning.

As it was, he was on board the train that followed, which was held up until 10:30 a. m. by the wreck and he saw the whole terrible sight.

In 1904 Mr. Shamp, on a trip east, had already bought his ticket for the Twentieth Century Limited when circumstances arose which made it desirable that he take another train, from which he would not need to change in getting to Scranton, Pa. So he changed his ticket and took another train. The Twentieth Century Limited that he would have taken was wrecked near Cleveland.

In Green River Wreck. That same year Mr. Shamp was in the big Union Pacific wreck at Green River, Wyo., and had a miraculous escape. The services he rendered in rescue work on that occasion brought him and three or four others letters of commendation from the leading Union Pacific officials.

Mr. Shamp went to New York this time to attend an important conference of the International Union of Stationary Firemen, which took place March 24. Incidentally, he attended the big prize fight, and he says Willard seemed to have everything his own way. "He seemed almost to be afraid to hit Moran with all his strength," he said.

BARELY MISSED BIG WRECK

Business Kept Dooley from Riding on Twentieth Century Limited.

The horrors of the New York Central wreck at Amherst, Wednesday morning were witnessed by J. W. Dooley of Omaha, who passed by the scene of the

rail disaster a few hours after it occurred.

Mr. Dooley planned to leave New York Tuesday afternoon on the Twentieth Century Limited, the crack New York Central train that plowed through the wreckage of two other trains. A business appointment which he kept Tuesday afternoon caused him to miss the limited, with the result that he came west on the next fast train, the Cleveland Express, which left a few hours later.

The train on which Mr. Dooley was a passenger passed the scene of the wreck at 7 o'clock Wednesday morning. He described the terrible havoc and destruction wrought by the wreck of the three trains and told of seeing bodies, some of them headless and mangled beyond recognition, strewn about the right-of-way. According to Mr. Dooley, the sight was so appalling and sickening that many women on the Cleveland Express fainted as the train proceeded slowly past the wreckage.

Thousands Hurry to Scene. Thousands of people, he said, on foot, in automobiles and in every conceivable kind of vehicle were hurrying to the scene on the highways from Cleveland to Amherst.

shattered coaches, twisted rails and disfigured bodies could be imagined, he averred, in view of the fact that the steel coaches were buried window-down in the roadbed.

He declared that in his opinion there is no question but that many of the coaches were of wooden construction. According to Mr. Dooley they were

splittered and smashed as if they were heavy boxes.

Corn was a half cent up and sold at \$1 to 88 cents, the last named price being for dry and good grade stuff. There were fifty-eight carloads on the market.

Oats were down one-half cent and at 40 1/2 to 41 1/2 cents per bushel. The receipts were twenty-five carloads.

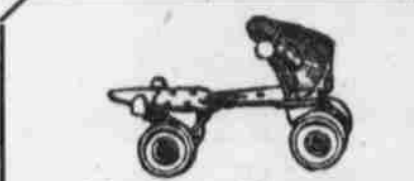
