CORN SHOOT UP HALF TO CENT

OMAHA, March 31, 1916. Wheat receipts were good today and the demand for this cereal was quite active. Cash wheat was quoted unchanged. Cash corn was strong, ranging from 1/2c to 1c higher.

Barley receipts were unimportant and the market for this cereal was quiet. Clearances of wheat and flour were equal to 75,000 bu.; corn, 315,000 bu.; oats, 85,000 bu.

HOGS STRONG TO FIVE HIGHER

OMAHA, March 31, 1916. Receipts were: Cattle, Hogs, Sheep. Official Monday, 7,600; Official Tuesday, 8,774; Official Wednesday, 15,444; Official Thursday, 2,865; Official Friday, 4,419.

CATTLE—Receipts were very slow this morning, only fourteen cars being reported in. For the week receipts amount to 20,000 head, the largest since two weeks ago.

Quotations on cattle: Good to choice heaves, \$12.50; fair to good heaves, \$12.00; poor to choice heaves, \$11.50.

HOGS—The sharp decline of the last few days is identical with receipts pretty effectively. For today's run was the smallest in some time, only seventy-five cars being reported.

Other markets: Sheep—Receipts were very slow this morning, only four cars being reported in.

NEW YORK STOCK MARKET

Professional Selling Factor of Considerable Importance at Irregular Session.

MOVEMENT IS DEPRESSED

NEW YORK, March 31.—Professional selling, which concentrated around some of the leading railroad issues was a factor of considerable importance in today's irregular and sluggish market. The movement against rails began at midday, New Haven being depressed 2 points to 6 1/2, its lowest price of the current year.

DESCRIBES CROWN PRINCE'S ADVANCE

Associated Press Correspondent Tells of Viewing Burning City of Verdun from Teuton Line.

GERMAN PROGRESS CONTINUAL

HEADQUARTERS OF THE ARMY OF THE GERMAN CROWN PRINCE, before Verdun, March 31.—(Via London and Berlin.)—German artillery is playing heavily on the north front of Verdun.

Eight miles westward, across the river, a mass of smoke columns, foating like a hazy forest of cypress above Bethincourt, Malancourt and Hill No. 304, testifies to the hail of high caliber shells which is falling on this northwestern outpost of the French positions.

Which of Two Attacked Question. Which of these two points will be the scene of the next phase of the German offensive is a question which doubtless is puzzling the mind of General Joffre and General Petain.

Interviews Captives. During the day the correspondent had an opportunity of interviewing a large number of French prisoners captured in Avocourt wood. They were surprised by the German tactics, which were based on artillery of such precision that the Germans were able to start their charge while the artillery was still playing on the French trenches.

French Cleared from Region. It was necessary to clear the French from this region before the German attack against the fortress could proceed. This has been accomplished. Of the old positions the French now hold only a narrow tongue of land between Dead Man's hill and Avocourt wood.

French Gunners Active. French gunners are no less active than the Germans, although their fire is more scattered. This is because the task of the French gunners is to search out the German batteries hidden over the entire landscape and restrict their activity as much as possible.
