MIKADO ACCLAIMED BY THE POPULACE

Progress of Ruler from Tokio to Nagoya Marked by Great Display of Loyalty.

CITY IS ABLAZE WITH LIGHT

KIOTO, Japan, Nov. 7 .- The progress of Emperor Yoshihito from Tokio to Nagoya, the first stage of his journey to Kloto, for the coronstion ceremonies, was marked by a remarkable display of national loyalty.

In every city and town through which the ruler passed the entire population assembled at the railway stations and in the adjacent highways, paying homage to the emperor and bowing low in worship to the Kashikodokoro, or divine, mirror, which represents the spirit of the grand imperial ancestress or sun goddess, Amaterasu Omikami, and which is a part of the imperial sanc-

In the rice land the peasants abandoning the mattocks, led their children along the railroad and worshipped the sanctuary.

Everywhere the horizon was black with school children, grown people and troops, mounted and on foot. As the emperor entered Nagoya at dusk, the ancient castle burst into a bewildering

illumination visable from afar. Kloto is an enchanting fairyland. There is a mammoth electric monument at the railway station and the long wide avenue leading from the station is dazzling with electric garlands. The narrow side streets are a mass of yellow and red paper lanterns, while huge pillars of light guard the city here and there like giant modern Samurai. The emperor is expected to arrive her Sunday afternoon.
