NEW YORK STOCK MARKET

Heavy Liquidation of Day Before Renewed with Greater Vigor.

OFFERINGS

NEW YORK, Nov. 9.—The heavy liquidation which swapt over yesterday's late market was renewed with greater vigor today, all parts of the list scoring new minimums for the current movement. The decline gathered increased force from professional scurres, traders in general being active on the short side of the account. Foreign offerings were also an important factor, estimates of London's sale ransing from 25,000 to 36,000 shares. In fact much of the day's unsettlement was caused by further pessimistic advices from abroad. These bore largely upon political and financial conditions affecting the allied nations and were supplemented by unconfirmed rumors that large war orders were in danger of cancellation. Apart from steady preasure, however, the market manifested many symptoms of an artificial character which made it vulnerable to attack. Final prices were only a trille above low levels for high-grade securities, while specialties made only nominal recoveries. All the activity of the session was at the expense of values, trading becoming dull on every covering movement.

Total sales amounted to 1,135,000 shares. Some of the extreme declines are: Studebaker, 23 at 16; Willys-Overland, 25, at 216; General Motors, 20, at 276; Baldwin Locomotives, 4, at 113; Tennessee Copper, 5, at 51, and Great Northern Ore, 3, at 465. Shares in the so-called "near" war class, like American Linseed, common and products, lost 3 to 10 points. United States Steel, which was among the few leaders to show actual strength at the opening, declined to 35% and closed at 34%, a net gain of 4.

In the railways declines ran from 1 to 2 points, 5t. Paul, Norfolk & Western and the southern lines showing least reastance. Trading in these issues was broader than usual. Metal shares yielded much of their recent advance, although technical conditions in that industry continued aitogether favorable. Among the railway returns of the day was that of the Missouri Pacific system, showing a net decrease of \$273,000 for September.
