Nebraska WILD STILL HOLDS STATE HOUSE JOB

Bacteriologist Appears Merely to Have Been Working for the Parent Board. SECRETARIES ARE PEEVED

LINCOLN, Nov. 10.—(Special).—The attempt of the secretaries of the State Board of Health to get the "goat" of State Bacteriologist Wild is causing considerable merriment. Most people familiar with the workings of the board of secretaries are looking upon the matter as the joke of the season.

It is evident that some of the secretaries were piqued because the state bacteriologist would not follow their orders. Instead of those of the parent board, which had elected him to the position he holds.

An amusing part of the hearing yesterday appeared when Dr. E. Arthur Carr, a member of the secretaries' board, charged that Dr. Wild had sent out some letters to different sections of the state in an effort to find out what the board of secretaries was trying to pull off and that these letters were written on letterheads of the State Board of Health.

BELIEVED ROCK ISLAND IS AFTER HIGHER RATES

FAIRBURY, Neb., Nov. 10.—(Special Telegram).—Preliminary steps to secure an advance in passenger rates by the Rock Island were taken today when blanks were furnished to all Rock Island passenger and freight conductors of this city to make out what is known as rate card data for each trip for every train operating in the state of Kansas for a period of thirty days from this date until December 3.

The blanks were sent to Rock Island headquarters by operating officials of the second district at Topeka. Practically all freight and passenger trains operate through this point into Kansas.

It is believed by business and railroad men that it is the intention of the Rock Island to make a showing before the Interstate Commerce commission that an increase in rates is warranted.

Nebraska W. U. WILL FIGHT RATES

Telegraph Company Wants to Make Showing on Nebraska Ten-Word Message Charge. ACTION UNDER RECENT LAW

LINCOLN, Nov. 10.—(Special).—Representatives of the Western Union Telegraph company appeared before the State Railway commission today and asked for a hearing on the law passed by the legislature known as the Stebbens act which made a uniform charge of 25 cents on all ten-word messages within the state.

Nebraska STATE BAPTISTS ACTIVELY AT WORK

Reports of Department Heads at Grand Island Reveal Unusual Efforts by Denomination. MANY MISSIONARIES BUSY

GRAND ISLAND, Neb., Nov. 10.—(Special Telegram).—Reports of the heads of the various departments of work of the Baptist denomination in this state continue to be the leading feature of the Baptist state convention in session here.

The work in Japan was covered in an especially direct report by Rev. William Axling, a missionary in that country.

Twenty-five missionary workers have labored in the state, including evangelists, colporters and pastors at large. More than 125 special evangelistic campaigns have been held during the last year.

The convention elected the following officers: President, D. M. Ambery, Broken Bow; first vice president, J. A. Maxwell, Omaha; second vice president, J. L. Barton, North Platte; recording secretary, J. G. Batisle, Fremont; corresponding secretary, Fred Berry, Lincoln; treasurer, W. E. Rhodes, Omaha; historian, E. B. Cannon, Grand Island; trustee, J. W. Alter, Tekamah.

The plans for the ensuing year of the national convention were outlined by Dr. Chapman of Lincoln.

Increase in baptism has been exceeded in only two previous years. All missionaries have been paid in full, with a balance in the fund of every department.

FARM RESIDENCE BURNS AS RESULT OF EXPLOSION

FAIRBURY, Neb., Nov. 10.—(Special Telegram).—The farm residence of C. B. Clarke, five miles southwest of Fairbury, near the county poor farm, was totally destroyed by fire early this morning. According to a statement made by Mr. Clarke when he was brought to Fairbury to receive treatment for serious burns sustained while trying to fight his way through the flames to secure \$50 in currency and valuable papers, he and his wife were out of doors when a can of vermin destroyer exploded on the stove as he was thawing it out.
