

NO WARNING, SAYS ANCONA'S CAPTAIN

Commander Says He Stopped His Ship as Soon as the First Shell Was Fired.

BERLIN PAPERS JUSTIFY ACT

NAPLES, Nov. 11.—(Via Paris, Nov. 12.)—The owners of the Italian liner Ancona, sunk in the Mediterranean by a submarine, have received the report of the Ancona's captain, in which he makes the positive charge that the submarine gave no warning to the liner or afforded those on board of it a chance to escape.

The first shot, the captain's report declares, was fired when the submarine was three miles distant. The captain immediately stopped the ship, he says, but this did not appear to satisfy the commander of the submarine, which continued to shell the liner.

The captain without delay ordered everybody to take to the boats, upon which, he declares, the submarine turned all its guns, killing and wounding many persons both in the boats and on the deck of the steamer. Some of the passengers who were thrown into the water and sought to save themselves by clutching the sides of the submarine were pushed away with jeers and insults, he asserts.

Berlin Papers Justify Sinking. BERLIN, Nov. 12.—(By Wireless to Bayville.)—"Discussing the case of the Italian steamship Ancona, which was sunk in the Mediterranean by a torpedo, Berlin newspapers," says the Overseas News Agency, "point out that according to the already published reliable information from the submarine that the vessel after receiving a warning from the submarine to stop and that the submarine, therefore, was fully justified in using force."

The Overseas News Agency continues: "The newspapers further assert that all the news from foreign sources agree that the submarine sunk the Ancona on the Italian flag."

Ambassador Page Busy

ROME, Nov. 12.—(Via Paris.)—United States Ambassador Page, called at the foreign office today and had a long talk with Baron Sonnino. The nature of the conference is unknown, but it is assumed the sinking of the Ancona was discussed informally. The Italian government has ordered a rigid investigation of the disaster. The inquiry is proceeding under the direction of the Italian consul at Tunis assisted by Italian naval officers.

A special effort is being made to determine all the facts relating to international responsibility, whether warning was given and whether an opportunity was afforded the passengers to escape. It is expected here this investigation will have a bearing on any diplomatic representations the United States may make in behalf of American passengers on board the steamer.

Sioux City Prisoner Retaken at Missouri Valley After Fight

MISSOURI VALLEY, Ia., Nov. 12.—(Special.)—After a gun fight, in which Special Agent O. C. Rock, Bob Morton, E. O. Franke and Sheriff M. D. Myers took an active part, Jack Brannan, alias California Whitey, held at Sioux City for complicity in the Sioux City bank robbery of September 11, saved out of the Sioux City jail last night at 7 o'clock, and Attorney O. T. Nagastad of Sioux City promptly notified Special Agent Rock, and Rock promptly notified city officers on the police force in the different towns along the different railroads, and last night, between 9 and 10, Brannan was sighted, and in the struggle he made a desperate effort to shoot Morton in the switch yard. O. E. Fienna came to the assistance of Morton, and later Rock and Myers and the much wanted Brannan with an inclination to the banking business, was overpowered, froned, and then taken to Leocan, and this morning taken to Sioux City.

PEACE CONFERENCE WILL BE HELD SOON

(Continued from Page One.) gress, and much of the information communicated to the president today was gathered by Miss Adams and her companions. Dr. Jordan took the position that it would be more natural for the European neutrals to invite the United States to participate in the peace conference than for the United States to issue the invitation. He said that an unofficial meeting of peace advocates at Berno December 14, at which plans for bringing about peace will be discussed, would be attended by people from the United States.

Voluntary Court of Mediation

The idea of the quasi-official peace conference suggested to President Wilson on behalf of the International Peace congress by Dr. Jordan was that it would constitute a voluntary court of continuous mediation, would invite suggestions for settlement from each of the warring nations, and in any case would submit simultaneously to all of them reasonable proposals as a basis for peace.

Dr. Jordan did not reveal what President Wilson said to him, but the president several times has taken the position that he will be glad to do anything of a practical nature to end the war. Dr. Jordan refused to predict whether the peace efforts would be successful in the near future.

Dr. Jordan told the president peace advocates constantly were in touch with people in the warring countries and that there were organizations actively at work in all parts of the civilized world bringing to bear to end the war. Ultimately, he said, those efforts were certain to be successful.

The Christmas season is the natural time to talk peace, Dr. Jordan declared, and, therefore, he is expecting the plans of the peace advocates to take definite form about that time.

LIBERTY BELL HALF HOUR IN LOS ANGELES
LOS ANGELES, Cal., Nov. 12.—The Liberty Bell, with its escort of Pennsylvania, reached here at 8 o'clock this morning, three hours late, and was started on its journey to San Diego half an hour later. It is expected to arrive in San Diego shortly after noon. There were no ceremonies here.

Three Beatrice Men Arrested at Peoria

BEATRICE, Neb., Nov. 12.—(Special.)—According to a paper published at Peoria, Ill., C. E. Irvine, Paul and George Wayham, three Beatrice boys, are in jail at that place on the charge of being members of a gang of automobile thieves. Their arrest with three other men followed the theft of a Ford car from a man named Kay. The paper says that George Wayham and Irvine were arrested in a gray "shoot car" geared to sixty miles an hour. The two were armed with automatic revolvers, and when taken by the officer gave their names as Charles Gray and Bertie Wylie. They stated that the automatic revolvers found in their possession were taken for the purpose of shooting rabbits along the roadway.

According to the statement of Sheriff Butts the men have been engaged in the systematic theft of automobiles for some time, altering engine numbers at the Wayham garage and also changing parts of the machine. It is alleged that the numbers were obtained from the Illinois secretary of state, which were used on cars after the engine numbers had been altered.

REPRESENTATIVE BLAUSER IS PUT UPON THE GRILL

FAIRBURY, Neb., Nov. 12.—(Special Telegram.)—C. L. E. Blauser, who represented the Thirty-second district in the Nebraska legislature last winter, went on the witness stand this afternoon and testified to his relations with his mother at the Blauser home near Diller prior to her death last January.

Mr. Blauser asserted he did not know the contents of the will wherein he was beneficiary to \$25,000, while eight other children received \$15,000 and one daughter \$100.

An effort to impeach his testimony followed and the family Bible, neighborhood gossip, a school house scandal dealing with an alleged deficit in the auditing of the books, the general reputation of Representative Blauser for truth and veracity, and numerous other items figured in the evidence brought out by the counsel for the contestants.

Attorney John C. Hartigan rebutted the evidence by asserting that Mr. Blauser had been elected by a vote of two to one in his home precinct and that he had been treasurer of the Blauser school

LINCOLN, Neb., Nov. 12.—(Special Telegram.)—Somebody crawled through a hole last night that had been made to admit the new boiler at the heating plant on the state house grounds and turned on the water. As a result the plant became flooded, the water was forced through pipes which in turn forced the heat into the radiators at the governor's mansion and the latter became flooded doing considerable damage.

Inspection of the boiler revealed the conditions and called for assistance and the water was turned off.

The contract was let for the new boiler last August and the hole made in the side of the boiler house at the time, but the boiler has not been installed and cold weather approaches.

The deputy sheriff also testified to having been shown some tracks in the winter wheat field near Nelson's. These tracks, he said, were not found in the

robbery. In his search for a motive for the crime, he questioned Nelson as to whether jealousy over some girl might have caused the assault. It was in response to his questions that Nelson then told of his keeping company with Miss Mary Peterson and that Luff had formerly kept company with her.

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Rev. Byron Beal Dies of Apoplexy

LINCOLN, Neb., Nov. 12.—(Special.)—Rev. Byron Beal, a well known pastor of Lincoln and one of the pioneer preachers of the state, died suddenly of a stroke of apoplexy this morning at his residence in this city. It was the third stroke in six years. He came to Nebraska in 1883 and settled around Fort Kearney, and divided his time between preaching the gospel and fighting the Indians.
