

HUGHES REPEATS  
USE OF HIS NAME  
AGAINST HIS WISH

Associate Justice of the Supreme Court Stands by Statement Made Early to Associated Press on Candidacy.

FILING MAY BE REPUDIATED  
Intimation Given in Washington by Friend of Judge that Nebraskans Have Flashed the Game.

PETITION ON FILE AT LINCOLN

WASHINGTON, Nov. 13.—(Special Telegram.)—Associate Justice Hughes is not in politics in any sense of the word. The statement he gave to the Associated Press in the early spring with reference to the fact that his name was being used as a presidential candidate, that he could not be considered for that exalted office, is just as strong in his mind today as it was when he made the declaration. He has had no occasion to change the current of his thought and he will allow the whole question to rest just where it is, without so much as giving an interview to those seeking honest information or those trying to benefit by conditions, when the presidency is under such serious consideration by republicans.

These observations are the result of an interview tonight by The Bee correspondent with a close friend of the ex-governor of New York, who for various reasons does not desire that his name be mentioned.

Had No Authorization.  
It was learned here today that ex-Chairman A. C. Epperson had filed a petition with the secretary of state of Nebraska placing the name of Associate Justice Hughes on the republican primary ballot, and with this information The Bee correspondent sought to ascertain if there had been any authorization for this action, and no far an investigation goes nothing shows that Mr. Epperson has consulted anybody but his own family, and those of his friends in filing Justice Hughes' name with the proper state authorities to be voted for in the republican primaries next April for president.

Would Not Permit Candidacy.  
"The difficult and intricate problems with which the supreme court has to deal would not permit a member of that court to enter upon a political campaign," said a close friend of the associate justice.

Petition Filed at Lincoln.  
LINCOLN, Neb., Nov. 13.—(Special Telegram.)—The name of Associate Justice Charles E. Hughes was filed for the republican nomination for president in the office of the secretary of state here this afternoon. The petition, which was presented by J. Reid Green of Lincoln, states that the signers are aware of the fact that Justice Hughes has announced that he is not a candidate in any sense of the term and that he has refused to permit the use of his name by friends in other states. 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FIVE MILLIONS OF MEN KILLED DURING THE WAR

Swiss Military Statistician Calculates Total Losses in Slain Since Great Conflict Began.

BULGARS IN CRITICAL POSITION

Simultaneous Advances by French and Serbs Endanger Army to West of Vardar.

MORE ALLIES LAND AT SALONIKI

BASEL, Switzerland, Nov. 13.—Colonel Heussler, a Swiss military statistician, calculates the total losses in killed in the present war at 5,000,000.

SALONIKI, Nov. 12.—(Via Paris, Nov. 13.)—The entire Bulgarian force operating west of Vardar has been endangered by simultaneous offensives undertaken by Serbian and French forces, according to advices from the front received here. The Serbs have retaken the offensive in the Supurgora district, and are reported to have defeated the Bulgars at Katchanik pass, inflicting such heavy losses that the invaders were demoralized. Two French cavalry raids are said to have cleared the ground between Krivopal and Vales.

German Advance in North Serbia. BERLIN, Nov. 13.—(By Wireless to Sayville.)—Continuing their pursuit of the Serbian army in the district south-east of Krusevac, the German forces have crossed the Jastrebac mountain range, according to an official statement given out today by the German army headquarters. More than 1,500 Serbians were made prisoners yesterday and one cannon was captured.

Omaha Woman is Reported Hurt in a Wreck in Colorado

SALIDA, Colo., Nov. 13.—Eight passengers and three dining car employees were slightly injured when two sleeping cars and the dining car of Denver & Rio Grande passenger train No. 4, southbound, was derailed early today about seven miles west of here. The derailment was caused by a broken rail.

Italian Ship Firenze Sunk by Submarine; Twenty-One Missing

ROME, Nov. 12.—(Via Paris, Nov. 13.)—The Italian steamer Firenze, of 2,973 tons gross, has been sunk by a submarine. Twenty-seven passengers and ninety-six members of the crew were saved. Six passengers and fifteen of the crew are missing.

Five Convicts Flee From Kansas Prison

LEAVENWORTH, Kan., Nov. 12.—Five prisoners made their escape from the Kansas state penitentiary at Lansing at 8 o'clock tonight and at a late hour still were at large. The five were in separate cells when all of the cells were unlocked. Leaving the cells they broke through the roof of the building with an iron bar and let themselves down outside the wall by a rope made of bed sheets.

DR. GREIL TELLS STORY OF ANCONA

American Woman Says Ship Was Bombarded While Passengers Were Trying to Enter Boats.

HER MAID KILLED BY SHELL  
PARIS, Nov. 13.—Passengers aboard the liner Ancona were compelled to seek safety in the boats while the steamer was subjected to a cannonade from an Austrian submarine, according to a story of the tragedy told by Dr. Cedile L. Greil of New York to the Havas correspondent at Ferryville. The American woman saved herself by dropping from the deck into a launch which already was in the sea. Her maid was killed in their cabin by a gunshot.

Maid Killed in Cabin.  
"I saw through a slight fog a submarine about a hundred yards distant. It was equipped with two cannons, forward and aft, which were being fired rapidly. I went down to my cabin to get my papers and there found my maid, who pleaded with me to save her. A cannon shot interrupted our conversation. A shell entered the vessel through the porthole and killed my maid. I went up to the deck with a life belt.

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GREEK ATTITUDE CAUSES ANXIETY AMONG ENTENTE

Arrival of German Military Mission at Athens Adds to Uneasiness Regarding the Next Move to Be Made.

PROGRESS IN BALKANS SLOW

French and British Armies Said to Be Making Their Presence Felt in South Serbia.

RUSS HARRASS HINDENBURG

LONDON, Nov. 13.—Uneasiness is being shown by the entente allied powers over the attitude of Greece, and this feeling is not likely to be allayed by the latest news that a German military mission has arrived at Athens by way of Bulgaria and Saloniki.

Progress in Balkans Slow.  
Progress in the Balkan campaign is slow, with Serbia's allies beginning to make their presence felt along the Macedonian frontier. French troops there are reported to be within a mile and a quarter of the town of Yules and to have occupied several villages on the right bank of the Vardar, but the expected Serbo-French junction before Babuna pass has not yet been effected.

Russian Harass Von Hindenburg.  
News from the eastern front agrees that Field Marshal von Hindenburg's situation in the Ruma district is becoming extremely difficult. The Russians, continuing their attacks between Olai and west of Lake Habt are reported to be forcing the Germans into the woods and marshes, which greatly hamper the movements of the Teutons. In an effort to overcome these difficulties the Germans are exerting every energy to complete the railroad which they are building in Courland.

German Officers Visit Saloniki.  
ROME, Nov. 12.—(Via Paris, Nov. 13.)—Four German officers arrived at Saloniki from Sofia on October 31 and spent three days motoring in the district, especially in the section where the allied troops were concentrated on the 30th, according to a story printed by the Mattino under a Saloniki date. They are said to have been taken to Piraeus on a Greek torpedo boat.

King Constantine was assured by the German ambassador Mattino's correspondent reports that Roumania would remain neutral and that Bulgaria's pledge to Greece would be guaranteed by Germany.

German Mission Reaches Athens.  
GENEVA, Nov. 12.—(Via London.)—The correspondent at Athens of the Tribune de Geneve reports the arrival at the Greek capital of an Austro-Hungarian diplomatic mission to regulate the political and military situation between the central powers and Greece.

U. S. Nurse Dies in France.  
CHICAGO, Nov. 12.—The death in France of Miss Margaret Hamilton of St. Louis, one of the nurses who went with the Chicago corps in the British army, was revealed in a letter received today from Miss Elizabeth A. Robinson, a nurse in the same corps. She was a victim of spinal meningitis.
