Misconduct, Neglect and Inefficiency Charged Against Commission Chairman.

FINDINGS OF LEGISLATIVE BODY

NEW YORK, Nov. 13 .- 'Misconduct in office, neglect of duty and inefficiency" are among the reasons given by the legislative committee investigating the Public service commission in a public statement tonight for its recommendation to Governor Whitman for the dismissal from office of Edward E. McCall, chairman of the Public Service comission of this district.

Mr. McCall formerly was a justice of the state supreme court, from which he resigned in 1913 to become a service commissioner. In the fall of that year he was an unsuccessful democratic candidate for mayor of lew York, being defeated by John Purroy Mitchel, the fusion nominee.

Findings Under Sine Heads. In the statement the legislative investigating committee groups its findings unfer nine heads. Of these four are deoted to "misconduct in office" and five are given under "neglect of duty."

While the committee, headed by State pecific charges, it makes numerous general accusations. Among these are that McCall "has exercised his official power and influence for the particular advantage and benefit of certain interests." The ommittee also accuses him of neing time required in official business in priate law practice for hire" and of failng "to give adequate service as a comin the supervision and the egulation of corporations."

Good Horses Are Scarce in Panama

(Correspondence of the Associated Press. PANAMA, Oct. 22-Much difficulty is being experienced by the United States troops in obtaining good horses for the various branches of the service in the canal sone. Very few of the animals raised in Panama are either high or heavy enough for the requirements of the army.

Recently Lieutenant Joseph A. Marmon, aide de camp to Brigadier General Clarence R. Edwards, commanding the Panama canal troops, made a trip to the province of Chiriqui to obtain horses. Out of more than 200 examined only eleven came anywhere near the army specifications. All of them were under fourteen hands high.

General Edwards made a trip to Costs Rica, where he purchased a few animals. but they also are not quite up to the army specifications. Army officers believe it will be necessary to obtain re-mounts from either Chile or Jamaica, but the latter market, because of the war, is now temporarily closed.
