Wrestling Person Named Aberg Talks of Grappling F. Gotch for Hundred Thousand Bet.

NEW YORK, Nov. 13.—Look out, Frank Gotch! Aberg, the awful, is after you! Aberg says that he has just \$100,000 that he is willing to gamble with, and is willing to bet any part of it that he can pin your shoulders to the mat at any style of wrestling you prefer.

Aberg was feeling very confident. He had just thrown Wladek Zbyzsko. These two men had previously wrestled to a four-round draw in the final of an international tournament some months ago.

They were matched again to a finish in Madison Square garden, and Aberg won in one hour and 45 minutes. It was the first defeat Zbyzsko ever suffered.

Aberg is the world's champion at the Graeco-Roman style, has not lost a fall in ten years. And he has taken part in some 1,000 matches.

Alex Aberg does not talk very good English. He is an Estonian by birth. Estonia is a part of Russian Finland. However, despite his meagre knowledge of our language, we were able to make out that he does not think much of our Frank Gotch, either as wrestler or a man.

Alex Aberg says that he is a fake champion—that is, not a champion at all. He explains that he is a poor performer and a glibly able Frank's most famous victims such as Hackenschmidt, Stanislaus Zbyzsko and Yusuf Mahmoud.

According to Aberg, Gotch feared to take part in any of the big tournaments abroad, principally in Paris, Berlin and Vienna, where all of the world's best men are entered. The winner of one of these tournaments is the only true champion, he says.

According to Alex, the greatest wrestler in the world are Lurich Wladek Zbyzsko, Padoubny and himself. He has beaten Lurich twice and Zbyzsko once, but was never able to throw Padoubny, the giant Cossack, though they struggled five hours to a draw once.

He did beat a man who succeeded in downing Padoubny. This wrestler's name is Haasun Nourah. Nourah is probably the strongest man in the world. He is seven feet and two inches tall and weighs 400 pounds.

Aberg is 22 years old and has been wrestling thirteen years. "When do you expect to retire?" he was asked.

"When I have a million dolls," Alex replied. "How soon till then?" "Oh, 'bout six, maybe seven year, yah."

Major Loop Teams Must Take Wallup At Reserve Lists

NEW YORK, Nov. 13.—Organized base ball is clearing the decks for a strenuous winter campaign. The Federal league is not the least of the troubles which confront the National and American circuits.

Several vital issues must be fought out at the annual December meetings here and in the schedule meetings next spring.

The reserve lists of the sixteen major league clubs, just published, show no less than 530 players claimed for eligibility in 1916.

The New York Yankees took the field with forty-seven men. The St. Louis Browns have laid claim to forty-one.

Most of the clubs are within the thirty-five limit prescribed by base ball law; some are away below this figure.

The Yankees and Browns are not trying to cheat. They are simply the victims of circumstances which must be adjusted before the opening of another season.

Many of the players on the reserve lists of these two clubs will not be asked to go south in the spring. Take the New York Americans as an example.

There was an unusual harvest of dead wood on the payroll when Messrs. Ruppert and Hurton bought the club from Frank Farrell. Much of this which was trimmed out still appears on the new owners' books.
