Withnell to Advise Fire Box System in Business District

Superintendent Withnell of the fire department will recommend to the city council Tuesday morning the installation of a modern fire alarm telegraphic system in the "high value business district," bounded by Laka, Pierce and Twenty-fourth streets.
Mr. Withnell has an estimate which places the cost at \$90,000 and \$5,000 a year for maintenance. It is proposed to build a central station, which may be enlarged as the alarm system is extended.
The first proposition was to cover the entire city at an estimated expenditure of \$150,000, the fire underwriters urging this additional protection as necessary before insurance rates are lowered.
Mr. Withnell feels confident that the proposed system in the business district will meet the requirements of the underwriters and at the same time afford needed protection. Tentative plans call for 300 boxes within the territory outlined.

M. P. RAISES ITS PASSENGER RATES

New Tariff Received and Advance is to Go Into Effect on Wednesday.

COMPETITIVE POINTS SAME

The local passenger office of the Missouri Pacific has received its tariffs providing for the increased rates within Nebraska, as provided for by the decision of the federal court, recently handed down here, when Judges Sanborn, Munger and Pollock enjoined the Nebraska State Railway commission from interfering in the proposed increase from 2 to 3 cents per mile on all intrastate business.

The new tariffs do not make any change in the rates from competitive points to competitive points. For instance, the rate from Omaha to Plattsmouth and Nebraska City, and all other stations where there are other roads operating between the points, remains at 2 cents per mile.

The following is given as an example of what the advance amounts to in the matter of the cost of tickets, the rate being from Omaha:

With the exception of to and from competitive points, a corresponding increase applies to all stations in the state, both to and from Omaha and likewise between stations.
According to the information received from the general offices in St. Louis, the new rates will become effective Wednesday of this week.

OMAHA MAY MEET KANSAS' DEMAND

An Effort to Be Made to Raise the Money Asked by the Wichita Authorities.

EXPECT THE PAPERS SOON

A determination to bring to Omaha Arthur Hauser, highway man and alleged murderer of W. H. Smith, is expressed by Acting Chief of Police Michael Dempsey.

"I think that \$1,000 is more than a sufficient sum to be asked by the Wichita folk, but regardless whether it is or not, we are going to attempt to raise the amount they demand," remarked Dempsey.

In consultation with Commissioners Butler and Kukul it was determined that a proposition be put before the council to raise the reward of \$300 offered by the city to \$600. This will be discussed at the Tuesday session of the council.

Also Captain Dempsey has talked with Chief Deputy Sheriff William A. Foster, who will ask Sheriff McShane on the latter's return to the city, to communicate with Governor Morehead for a \$200 reward from the state. "As Smith was a citizen and taxpayer of Council Bluffs I think they should offer something, and we are certain that the Woodmen of the World will increase their \$300 reward. We will have no difficulty, I am sure, in getting the required sum to bring this man to his just deserts."
