ASKS CLEMENCY FOR HILLSTROM

American Federation of Labor Unanimously Passes Resolutions Asking Governor to Intervene.

ANOTHER TRIAL IS REQUESTED

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Nov. 16.—Resolutions asking clemency for Joseph Hillstrom, member of the Industrial Workers of the World, sentenced to be shot at Salt Lake City, Utah, Friday, were passed unanimously today by the American Federation of Labor, meeting here in its thirty-fifth annual convention.

In the resolution it was declared that it was "apparent Hillstrom did not have a fair trial." The resolutions were presented by the ways and means committee, to which the case was referred yesterday by President Samuel Gompers after appeals for action in the case were made before the convention by Thomas Mooney, not a member of the convention, and Delegate Camomile, both of Salt Lake City.

The resolutions authorized President Gompers to transmit immediately copies of the resolutions to Governor William Spry of Utah, the board of pardons of Utah, the Swedish ambassador to the United States and President Wilson.

Governor Spry was urged "to exercise his prerogative of clemency in the case and to stop the execution of Hillstrom, and that he be given a new and fair trial."

"The feeling against Hillstrom as a labor agitator was such as to militate against him with the jury to his detriment," the resolution said, and, also, that the evidence against him was "purely circumstantial and highly improbable," and that there was the "gravest doubt" as to its sufficiency.

It was stated that the resolutions were presented after the convention has listened to persons who claimed to be conversant with the facts and after investigating the case thoroughly.

KEARNEY, Neb., Nov. 15.—(Special Telegram.)—An unidentified young man was killed by Union Pacific train No. 13 on Monday night. The body was found by a railroad crew about four miles east of this city. Apparently the young man was sitting at a table and fell from the train, the wheels passing over his neck and severing the arms. Several believe him a man well known in this city, who resided in the western part of the state. He was of sandy complexion, smooth-shaven, about 30 years old, weight about 150 pounds and about five feet ten inches in height. He wore a blue serge suit and soft felt hat, a gray woolen shirt and heavy workman's shoes.

CHARGE AUSTRIANS ACTIVE IN STRIKE

Cleveland Officer Alleges Diplomats Are Fomenting Labor Trouble in Automobile Plant.

SAYS HE WAS OFFERED BRIBE

CLEVELAND, O., Nov. 16.—Louis Loeb, a native Hungarian, serving as city immigration officer, today charged activity by the Austro-Hungarian embassy at Washington in the strike of machinists at the Theodore Kuntz factory here. The Kuntz plant has been manufacturing rods for automobiles to fill war orders for the entente allies and has been tied up several weeks by a strike.

Charge Under Activity. Loeb's charges came in connection with his defense before Mayor Newton D. Baker of informal charges that he had been unduly active in his connection with the strike. He told the mayor that one of the chief advisers of the strikers, whom he was convinced was in the pay of the Austro-Hungarian government, had offered in his hearing to "sell out" the strikers for \$5,000. He told the mayor he became suspicious that this adviser was loyal to the Austro-Hungarian embassy at Washington and desired to "test him out" to see if he would sell out to the other side.

Loeb offered in proof of his charges a dictagraph record taken by a private detective in an adjoining room in a local hotel when the \$5,000 bribe was alleged to have been solicited, October 31. A majority of the Kuntz strikers are Austro-Hungarians.

SHE TRAVELS 20,000 MILES

DENVER, Colo., Nov. 16.—The vows given in a proxy wedding here last January were not confirmed, according to the laws of the island of Java, and Miss Eugenia Campbell, the bride, has returned to Denver, concluding a round-trip journey of approximately 20,000 miles. Miss Campbell and John Pieter Scholten, an honorary officer in the Dutch army, met at Cripple Creek in 1913. Shortly afterward they became engaged, but before the wedding Scholten was ordered to his post at Java. A proxy wedding was arranged. Miss Campbell participated in the ceremony here, which was performed by Rev. Davis H. Fouse. A similar ceremony was participated in by Scholten at Batavia.
