

CAATTLE—There was a fair run of cattle for a Thursday, 116 cars being reported in. For the five days the total amounts to 27.624 head, being more than double the receipts of a year ago.

There seemed to be a fair demand for range beef steers, especially for this late in the week, and anything along that line commanded steady prices. On the other hand cornfed beeves were extremely slow and weak. While a few choice cornfeds always sell well at this time of the year, especially light yearlings, no one wants the half-fat or warmed-up to pretty good kinds. Such cattle do not kill out to as good advantage as the hard, well-matured range beeves, and packers invariably give the latter the preference. This means that the market on cornifed cattle, aside from fancy grades, is unsatisfactory to sellers, not only here, but at every other market point.

Cows and helfers showed little change, prices for the most part being steady.

Feeders, as is apt to be the case this late in the week, were slow. Speculators already had a good many cattle on hand and were not inclined to take on very much unless they could shade prices a little. As a result the general market was slow and weak to lower.
