

CRIMSON BATTLES BLUE WARRIORS

Harvard and Yale Meet in Final Contest of Their Respective Schedules.

DOPE GIVES ELIS SMALL SHOW

CAMBRIDGE, Mass., Nov. 19.—With their banners of crimson and blue flung to the breeze as in the old days when they battle for the championship of the gridiron, the foot ball teams of Harvard and Yale meet here today in the final contest of their respective schedules.

While there is no possibility of new attendance or gate receipt records this fact is due to inability to accommodate more than 47,000 persons in the stadium of Soldiers field.

Yale Outlook Not Bright. If such were the case there would be many empty tiers in the stadium today, for not in many years has Yale come to Cambridge with such a dismal record as that made by the team of 1915.

There are reasons, however, why Yale has not entirely given up hope of being able to save a most disastrous season from ruin by winning or tying with the Cambridge combination in the closing contest of the year.

Crimson Great Machine. That Yale should succeed where these powerful teams failed seems unlikely, but the hopeful point out that man for man there is little advantage one way or the other.

Yale Wins Most Games. Even though defeat be its portion, Yale will not be without some consolation for it will be many years before Harvard can overtake the long lead that the Blue gained in the early days of foot ball between the two institutions.

MANY BIG BATTLES ON GRIDS OF EAST

General Interest Centers on Cambridge Game, but Several Others of Importance Slated.

THREE STRONG TEAMS OUT

NEW YORK, Nov. 19.—While the Harvard-Yale contest overshadows all other foot ball games to be played on eastern grids tomorrow, there are several other struggles which will have an important bearing on the final alignment of the eleven for the season of 1915.

General interest will be focused upon the outcome of the annual meeting of the Blue and Crimson, but the Dartmouth-Syracuse, Colgate-Georgetown, Trinity-Wesleyan contests and those in which the Army and Navy teams compete will all be followed with more than usual keenness.

Harvard a Favorite. Based upon the theory and science of modern foot ball, Harvard should be and is favored to defeat Yale, but that the game will follow these lines is not at all certain, since gridiron form has received far more than the usual number of jolts and upsets this fall.

The Harvard eleven of 1915 is not of the same caliber as Princeton, however, for the Crimson is built of better material and by a coaching system which is thoroughly established and working with perfect smoothness.

How Crimson Beat Tigers. Eliminating all consideration of the games that preceded the triangular contest between Yale, Princeton and Harvard it will be found that Harvard defeated Princeton as the result of a perfectly engineered team touchdown and one field goal by Mahan, against two by Tibbott.

Yale Makes Strides. Yale, since its string of defeats at the hands of Washington and Jefferson, Colgate and Brown, has made remarkable strides under the coaching of Tom Shevlin and others.

May Hinge on Stars' Work. It is not unlikely that the final outcome of the struggle will hinge upon the respective work of these two stars on their punting and drop-kicking duties.

In other games of tomorrow, Dartmouth and Syracuse are certain to have a battle royal, with the odds favoring the Orange, which has defeated decisively every eleven faced this fall except Princeton, and even the Tigers had to be satisfied with a single field goal against Syracuse.

Colgate will meet a strong southern eleven at Georgetown, but should win from the Washington team unless still crippled from the terrific struggle with Syracuse a week ago.

Both the Army and Navy are called upon to play teams of moderate strength and both should emerge victorious. Springfield Young Men's Christian association training school, which meets the cadets has a fast, but rather light eleven and while well equipped with overhead plays is hardly strong enough to hold the rushing soldiers in check.

The Middles will find Urstus stronger in line plunging and end running plays and with a fair repertoire of passes. Since these contests will be the final game for both Army and Navy before they meet in their annual inter-service battle, the results will be awaited with interest by all followers of the two academy elevens.
