

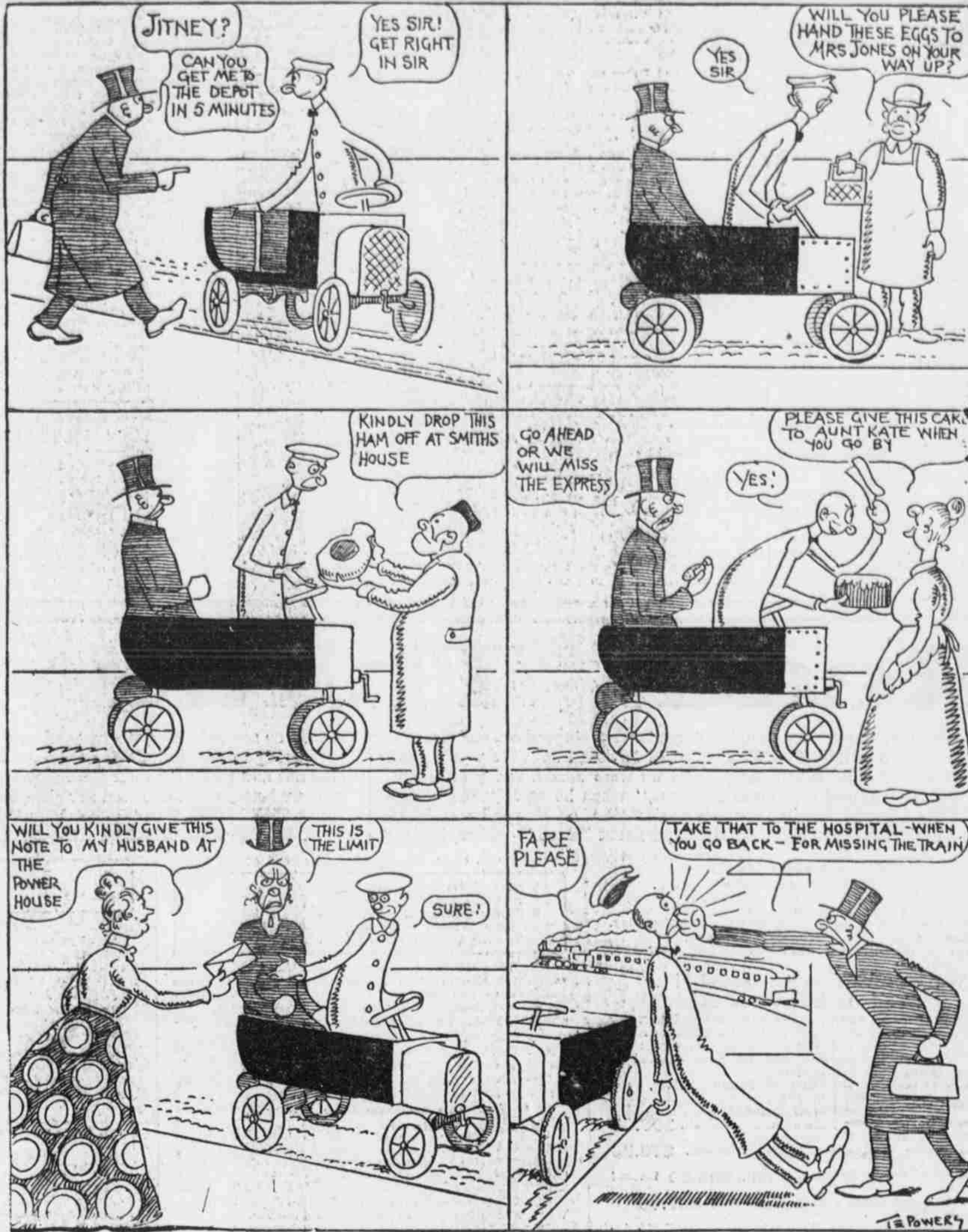

British Authorities Take Eitel Officer Who Violated Parole

LONDON, Nov. 19.—A German naval lieutenant from the German converted cruiser Prinz Eitel Friedrich, who broke his parole at Newport News, is now in the hands of the British naval authorities, according to information gleaned here today. The lieutenant was captured on board a Danish steamer which was searched in the North Sea early in the week. He was found among the crew and identified by an official who knew him before the outbreak of the war. Two officers of the German converted cruiser Prinz Eitel Friedrich, Lieutenant Koch and Dr. Kroneck, disappeared from the vessel at Newport, where it is interned, October 17. Later two others disappeared. At the time the vessel was interned, on April 7, the officers of the cruiser gave their parole to the United States government agreeing not to leave American soil. Naval officials are so disturbed over the continuing escapes that they have considered putting the German seamen ashore in a guarded camp, and recently asked the State department if the marine guard had a right to fire to prevent escapes.

Penrose Says He Did Not Authorize Report His Hat is in Ring

DENTON, Tex., Nov. 18.—Boles Penrose, United States senator from Pennsylvania, made the following statement today about reports last night from San Antonio, Tex., that he would shortly announce his candidacy for the republican nomination for the presidency. "I have been mentioned for the presidential nomination next year, but there is no authority from me for the statement from San Antonio last night that my announcement is shortly to be made. As a matter of fact, there are no candidates for the republican nomination yet, other than the complimentary votes and boasts for the favorite sons and for neighboring states' favorite sons, and the probability now is that the question of a nominee will be quite uninvolved until the convention has acted. Some of the greatest republican presidents have been of such convention nominations. Lincoln, Grant and Hayes, not to mention the others, have been in this class. Senator Penrose was here for a few minutes during the passage of the Liberty bell today.

MUST BE READY, ASSERTS BRADY

Writer Tells Knife and Fork Club United States Must Command Respect.

WAR IS CONFLICT OF IDEALS

Cyrus Townsend Brady, author and clergyman, who addressed the Omaha Knife and Fork club Thursday evening at the University club, was a clerk in the Union Pacific headquarters here twenty-eight years ago, under W. H. Hancock, whom he visited yesterday. "I haven't been here since I left the railroad offices, and I want to say I never saw such a change in a city. It is remarkable," said Mr. Brady. "Can't you remain over and visit a few days?" asked Rev. T. J. Mackay, who is an old friend of the famous writer. "Impossible, rector, I have to work for a living. Have to write books, preach and write moving picture plays," was the answer. Mr. Brady came in at noon and went from the University club direct to the depot. "National Preparedness" was the subject discussed by Mr. Brady, who was introduced by Prof. J. F. Woolery. "We need an army commensurate with our dignity and importance," Mr. Brady told his hearers, "and a navy strong enough to protect our shores; not for aggression nor to impose our will upon other people, but that our voice may be heard and that our citizenship shall be protected. "We should stand full-armed within the gates, because no man shall take our heritage from us. We will go on from strength to strength and will not close the doors, but will bid all men come and will assure them protection." A literary test upon immigrants was not favored. "This country is dedicated to life with its opportunities and liberty with its privileges," declared Mr. Brady. The speaker made a trip to Europe last summer on the ill-fated Ancona. On board was a foreign-born American who was a child when brought to this country by his father. He had been educated here and had voted fifteen years, but in spite of naturalization through his father he was detained in his native country and only by exercising his resourcefulness did he escape. Mr. Brady declared such a condition existed because we did not have the power to protect our citizenship. The European war was called a conflict of ideals rather than of conquest, revenue or for material things. It is a war to make men think in terms of this or that country, not in terms of humanity. COMMANDER URGES GIVE UP GALLIOLI

England Considers Abandoning Peninsula While Kitchener Chases Turks.

MOSLEMS LOSE 280 YARDS

LONDON, Nov. 19.—The attitude of the entente allies toward Greece, from which country they are endeavoring to get a definite guarantee for the safety of the French, British and Serbian troops, and the whole military policy in the near east, including the Dardanelles, will, it is expected, be made clear before the end of the present week. The council at Paris, in which British and French cabinet ministers took part, came to important decisions over the ground both in Gallipoli and the Balkans, is to report on the best means of dealing with the situation arising out of the Austro-German and Bulgarian successes in Serbia, and Greece's leanings toward the central powers. Favors Withdrawal. It transpired today during the course of the debate in the House of Lords that General Sir Charles Monro, the recently appointed commander-in-chief in the Dardanelles, has already given his opinion as to what should be the future policy with regard to the Gallipoli campaign. Lord Balfour, who introduced the subject, said he understood that the report of the general favored withdrawal. The Marquis of Lansdowne replied, that the representations and the evidence accompanying it was not considered sufficient to enable the government to come to a decision. Ten statements had hardly been made when the war office issued an account of the successful British attack on the Turkish trenches on either side of the Krithi Nullah, which led to the belief that Lord Kitchener, who is on the peninsula and who went out after General Monro's report had been received, had decided to persist in the operations. British Gain 280 Yards. The official report stated that the British army resumed the offensive and captured 280 yards of Turkish trenches. It was announced that the fifty-second division successfully attacked the Turks in the Krithi-Nullah, near the tip of the peninsula. It captured 100 yards of trenches to the east of the defile and 120 yards to the west. Andrew Bonar Law, the colonial secretary, assured the House of Commons that the decision would be left to the military experts and the question of the loss of prestige would have no weight. Promoters of the Monarchy in China Move Toward Object

WASHINGTON, Nov. 19.—Delayed somewhat by the opposition of the allied powers in the execution of plans for transformation of the Chinese government into a monarchy, the promoters of this movement nevertheless are moving steadily toward their object. According to the advices reaching here today, President Yuan Shi Kai has adopted a plan for meeting adverse criticism that might follow assumption of the throne by an official, who, like himself, had occupied the position of the closest confidence with the old Manchurian dynasty, and at the same time securing the active support of the powerful party of conservatives surrounding the little Manchurian emperor who still is living at Peking, in one of the imperial palaces. It is understood that Yuan will undertake, if he ascends the throne, to guarantee an annual allowance of \$4,000,000 to the little emperor as long as he lives; to recognize him as a Chinese prince, and to provide proper places in the government emoluments for the principal members of his family and his immediate adherents. It is proposed that the emperor issue an address to the Manchus explaining the conditions which have made it necessary for Yuan to assume the throne for the benefit of the Chinese people, and urging them to render him loyal support.

Nuber's Activities to Be Further Probed

WASHINGTON, Nov. 19.—Further investigation of the activities of Austrian Consul General von Nuber and his associates will be made by the Department of Justice as a result of yesterday's conference in New York between A. Bruce Bialski, chief of the bureau of investigations, and Dr. Joseph Gorkor, former Austrian consul. A department statement announcing this tonight also said that information had been obtained which probably would lead to further indictments for passport frauds. Submarine Inventor Honored. (Correspondence of the Associated Press.) STUTTGART, Germany, Nov. 18.—The inventor of the German submarine, Wilhelm Bauer, is to be honored by the city of his birth, Dillingen on the Danube, by a monument. An organization for the collection of funds has been named in Dillingen, and the subscription list has been headed by a donation from the mayor.
